Resolution 14-05

Sponsors

1	A RESOLUTION calling on the Washington state
2	Legislature to help improve the health of King County and
3	Washington state residents by maintaining current levels of
4	funding for foundational public health services and by
5	providing new, additional funding for public health,
6	dedicated revenue from a new tax on electronic vaping
7	devices, and encouraging other boards of health to adopt
8	similar resolutions in support of public health funding.
9	WHEREAS, every Washingtonian has the right to expect a strong network of
10	local public health jurisdictions and a basic level of public health services, and
11	WHEREAS, prevention and public health contributions such as safe drinking
12	water and immunizations have led to the greatest historical increases in life expectancy,
13	and
14	WHEREAS, public health plays a critical public safety role protecting all
15	Washingtonians, and
16	WHEREAS, an effective public health infrastructure is essential to decreasing the
17	burden of chronic disease and ensuring our children are healthy and ready to learn, and

WHEREAS, those most essential services that protect everyone - immunizations, 18 19 water and food safety, communicable disease prevention and services to vulnerable 20 children and families - must remain strong, and 21 WHEREAS, there is a continued need to protect people from communicable 22 diseases, whether Ebola, Enterovirus or E. coli, and other public health threats, and WHEREAS, this funding is an immediate, urgent need and is essential to keeping 23 24 the public health system operational, and 25 WHEREAS, funding and delivering foundational public health services and 26 additional important services is a shared responsibility between the state and local 27 governments, and 28 WHEREAS, many local governments have stepped up to ensure this critical 29 component of the broader public safety system in Washington state and King County remain functional, and 30 31 WHEREAS, substantial efforts are underway to ensure that the public health successes of the 20th century are carried forward by a nimble, sustainable, responsive, 32 33 cost-effective and accountable 21st century public health system, and WHEREAS, new electronic vaping devices are an emerging health hazard for 34 children and youth, and 35 WHEREAS, calls to the Washington Poison Center regarding to child nicotine 36 37 poisonings related to electronic vaping devices has increased six hundred percent in the 38 last few years, and

39	WHEREAS, ingesting even a mouthful of liquid nicotine intended for electronic
40	vaping devices is highly toxic for children, and can cause vomiting, nausea, seizures and
41	in extreme cases death, and
42	WHEREAS, liquid nicotine flavors for electronic vaping devices appeal strongly
43	to youth, and
44	WHEREAS, youth and young adults are more susceptible to nicotine addiction
45	than adults and nicotine has lasting adverse effects on adolescent brain development, and
46	WHEREAS, electronic vaping devices are currently unlicensed and unregulated,
47	and
48	WHEREAS, vapor products are currently much cheaper than traditional cigarettes
49	are not taxed, and
50	WHEREAS, young people are twice as price sensitive as adults to increases in
51	tobacco prices making taxation an effective strategy to curb use by youth and young
52	adults;
53	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Health of King
54	County:
55	A. The King County Board of Health calls upon the Washington state Legislature
56	to maintain at least the current level of state funding for the public health system in the
57	2015-2017 biennial budget;
58	B. The King County Board of Health calls upon the Washington state Legislature
59	to provide new, additional funding to stabilize the state's communicable disease
60	prevention and response system;

C. The King County Board of Health calls upon the Washington state Legislature to tax electronic vaping devices and dedicate a portion of the revenue to the state's public health system; and

D. The King County Board of Health strongly encourages other local boards of health in Washington to adopt similar resolutions.
