
OUR FAVORITE LAKE?

DID YOU KNOW?

- Most water that flows into storm drains is **not treated**, but goes directly into local waterways.
- Nationwide, **90 million** pounds of lawn care **pesticides** are applied each year to lawns, gardens, parks, and golf courses. These **chemicals** may enter groundwater or be washed into the nearest stream, lake, or other body of **water**.
- Each year more than 1.5 million gallons of motor oil (enough to fill a medium-sized tanker) end up in Puget Sound. Much of this oil is leaked from cars and washed into waterways.
- Pesticides and other lawn care chemicals used in your yard may go directly into the nearest stream, lake, or Puget Sound.



WARNING: Scientists testing our local urban streams found 23 pesticides used by homeowners.

STRANGE BUT TRUE

- Salmon spend a year in lakes and streams before heading out to Puget Sound.
 - Some pesticides, detergents, and other chemicals add estrogen, a female hormone, to waterways. **Exposure** of **fish** eggs to these substances can cause complete sex reversal of males to females.
 - Certain types of **flowers** contain a **natural** insecticide called pyrethrum.
- One ladybug may eat 2,400 aphids during its life.
- Ground beetles eat slug eggs, caterpillars, grubs and other garden pests.
- During the first hour of rain in a typical American city, roadway runoff carries more pollutants than untreated sewage.

POSITIVE ACTIONS

Help keep lakes clean and safe

- Maintain your car fix leaks.
- Use **safer alternatives** in the home and garden.
 - Avoid products that say "danger" or "poison."
- Store and dispose of hazardous products **safely**.
