


The four hazards









Toxic or poisonous

Capable of causing injury or death if swallowed, breathed in, or absorbed through the skin.







Flammable or combustible

Can catch fire at relatively low temperatures.





Corrosive

Can eat away materials and burn living tissue by chemical action.






Reactive

Can react with air, water, or other substances and result in fire, explosions, or toxic gases.





Read the label to identify a hazardous product

Dangerous look-alikes



Hazardous and non-hazardous products can look alike. Labels and proper storage can prevent accidents.

Signal Words



Highest hazard	DANGER, POISON
Less hazardous	CAUTION, WARNING
Safer	You don't see: DANGER, POISON CAUTION or WARNING

Poison or danger – The product is highly toxic, poisonous, corrosive, flammable or reactive.

Caution or warning – The product is slightly or moderately toxic, flammable, irritating, or reactive.

No signal word – The product is not indicated as hazardous.

Why must we properly dispose of household hazardous waste?


Hazardous products

- are harmful to sanitation workers.
- emit harmful vapors.
- harm pets, fish, birds, beneficial insects, and other wildlife.
- cause long-term negative effects on our environment.
- can contaminate water supplies and harm aquatic life, including fish.
- generally can't be removed in the water treatment process.

• Empty hazardous product containers such as aerosol cans, cleaner containers, motor oil containers

Hazardous waste collection site




Hazardous waste collection site

- Partially full or full containers marked caution, warning, danger or poison
- Some accepted products include
 - fertilizers
 - lighter fluid
 - pesticides
 - oven cleaner
 - rubber cement

Recycling Center

Special recycling centers and local businesses that are part of the Take It Back Network accept certain household hazardous wastes.

- Batteries
- Ink cartridges
- Motor oil, transmission fluid, antifreeze
- Non-working electronics (cell phones, TVs, computers, printers)
- Compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) and fluorescent tubes











Down the drain - NO



Down the drain

Household hazardous products should **not** be dumped down the drain as this can harm

septic and sewage lines.

- Send household products down the drain only when using them according to label directions.
- Use up cleaners marked caution or warning.
 Replace them with something safer next time.



Reuse or donate



Reuse or donate

- Cleaners marked caution or warning
- Laundry or dishwashing soap
- Functioning cell phones and other
 - electronics
- Usable paint
- New batteries



Proper disposal of household hazardous waste is important

Household hazardous waste collection programs safely store, reuse, recycle, treat and dispose of a community's household hazardous waste.
