## Public Disclosures for Non-Court Records

Under Washington State Court General Rule (GR) <u>31</u> (Linked page is not translated.), court records are records relating to court proceedings and are to be made available to the public, subject to exceptions. To learn how to request court records please visit "How to Request Court Records" below. **Court records** are not the same as **public records** as governed by the Public Records Act, Revised Code of Washington (RCW) <u>42.56.010</u> (Linked page is not translated.).

The Public Records Act defines a **public record** as "any writing containing information relating to the conduct of government or the performance of any governmental or proprietary function prepared, owned, used, or retained by any state or local agency regardless of physical form or characteristics." Essentially, this means that the Clerk's Office must keep record of any document that relates to how the Clerk's Office conducts business and that any person can request those public records.

When making your **public disclosure request**, the more information you provide to us regarding what type of record you are searching for, the more swiftly we will be able to provide a response. However, when requesting public records, asking for a broad spectrum of results such as "any" or "all" can take much longer to respond to. Per GR <u>33</u> (Linked page is not translated.), an accommodation request will be granted to any qualified person for whom an accommodation is reasonable and necessary. Learn how to submit an accommodation request <u>HERE</u>.

## How to Request Court Records

Most court documents are available online. To learn how to access court records, please visit our <u>Court Records</u> page. (Some information on linked page is not translated.) Having the case number related to the documents you seek will be the most valuable piece of information to aid you in your search.

The Clerk's Office can research the case numbers and provide the documents for you, should you need. However, there are fees associated with having the Clerk's Office research for you. Remember that you can view most court records for free by visiting any of the Clerks' Offices in person.

To submit a public disclosure request please fill out the <u>Public Records Request form</u> and follow the instructions on where to return your completed form. Please provide as much information and detail as possible.
