How Property Is Valued

King County along with Washington's 38 other counties use mass appraisal techniques to value all real property each year for property assessment purposes.

What Are Mass Appraisal Techniques?

In King County the Mass Appraisal process incorporates statistical testing, generally accepted valuation methods, and a set of property characteristics for approximately 700,000 residential, commercial and industrial properties. More specifically for residential property, we break up King County into 88 residential market areas and annually develop market models from the sale of properties using multiple regression statistical tools. The results of the market models are then applied to all similarly situated homes within the same appraisal area.

Are Properties Inspected?

All property in King County is physically inspected at least once during each six year cycle. Each year our appraisers inspect a different geographic area. An inspection is frequently an external observation of the property to confirm whether the property has changed by adding new improvements or shows signs of deterioration more than normal for the property's age. From the property inspections we update our property assessment records for each property. In cases where an appraiser has a question, they will leave or mail a card requesting the property owner contact them.

RCW 84.40.025 - Access to property

For the purpose of assessment and valuation of all taxable property in each county, any real or personal property in each county shall be subject to visitation, investigation, examination, discovery, and listing at any reasonable time by the county assessor of the county or by any employee thereof designated for this purpose by the assessor.

In any case of refusal to such access, the assessor shall request assistance from the department of revenue which may invoke the power granted by chapter [84.08](#) RCW.

How Are Property Sales Used?

For the annual revaluation of residential properties, three years of sales are analyzed with the sales prices time adjusted to January 1 of the current assessment year. Sales prices are adjusted for time to reflect that market prices change over time. During an increasing market, older sales prices often understate the current market value. Conversely, during downward (or recessionary) markets, older sales prices may overstate a property's value on January 1 of the assessment year unless sales are time adjusted. Hence time adjustments are an important element in the valuation process.

How is Assessment Uniformity Achieved?

We have adopted the Property Assessment Standards prescribed by the International Association of Assessing Officers that may be reviewed at www.IAAO.org. As part of our valuation process statistical testing is performed by reviewing the uniformity of assessments within each specific market area, property type, and quality grade or residence age. More specifically Coefficients of Dispersion (aka COD) are developed that show the uniformity of predicted property assessments. We have set our target CODs using the standards set by IAAO which are summarized in the following table:

Requirements of State Law

Within Washington State, property is required to be revalued each year to market value based on its highest and best use. (RCW 84.41.030; 84.40.030; and WAC 458-07-030). Washington Courts have interpreted fair market value as the amount of money a buyer, willing but not obligated to buy, would pay to a seller willing but not obligated to sell. Highest and Best Use is simply viewed as the most profitable use that a property can be legally used for. In cases where a property is underutilized by a property owner, it still must be valued at its highest and best use.

Appraisal Area Reports

The following area report summarizes the property assessment activities and results for a general market area. The area report is meant to comply with state law for appraisal documentation purposes as well as provide the public with insight into the mass appraisal process.

Coefficient of Dispersion (COD) is a measure of the uniformity of the predicted assessed values for properties within this geographic area. The 2020 COD of 5.82% is an improvement from the previous COD of 7.29%. The lower the COD, the more uniform are the predicted assessed values. Refer to the table on page 3 of this report for more detail surrounding COD thresholds. Area 072 is a more homogenous market area and the COD threshold prescribed by the IAAO should be no more than 10%. The resulting COD meets or exceeds the industry assessment standards. Sales from 1/1/2017 to 12/31/2019 (at a minimum) were considered in all analysis. Sales were time adjusted to 1/1/2020.

Physical Inspection Area:

State law requires that each property be physically inspected at least once during a 6 year revaluation cycle. During the recent inspection of Area 072 – Redmond/ South Woodinville/ Sammamish Valley, appraisers were in the area, confirming data characteristics, developing new valuation models and selecting a new value for each property for the assessment year. For each of the subsequent years, the previous property values are statistically adjusted during each assessment period. Taxes are paid on total value, not on the separate amounts allocated to land and improvements.

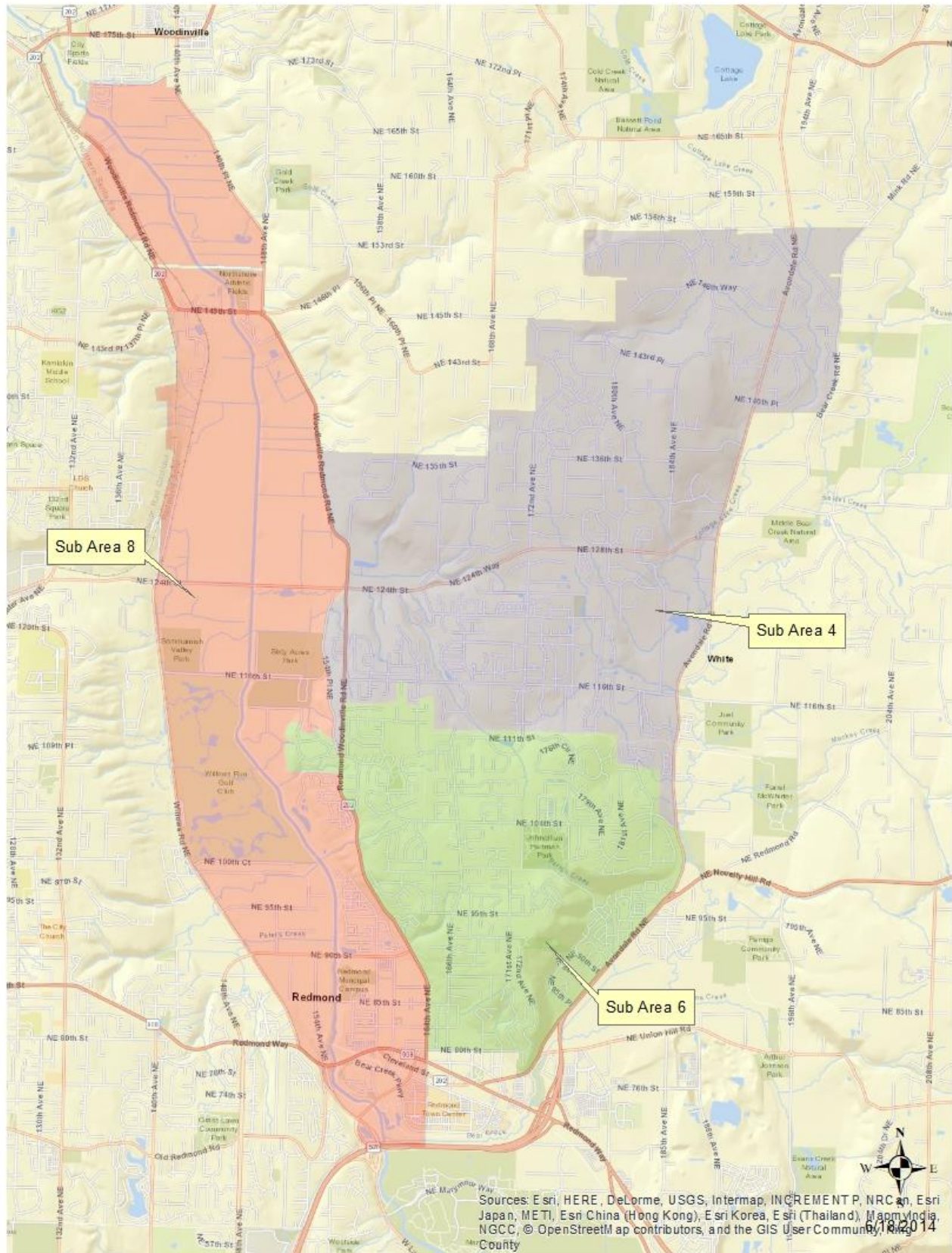

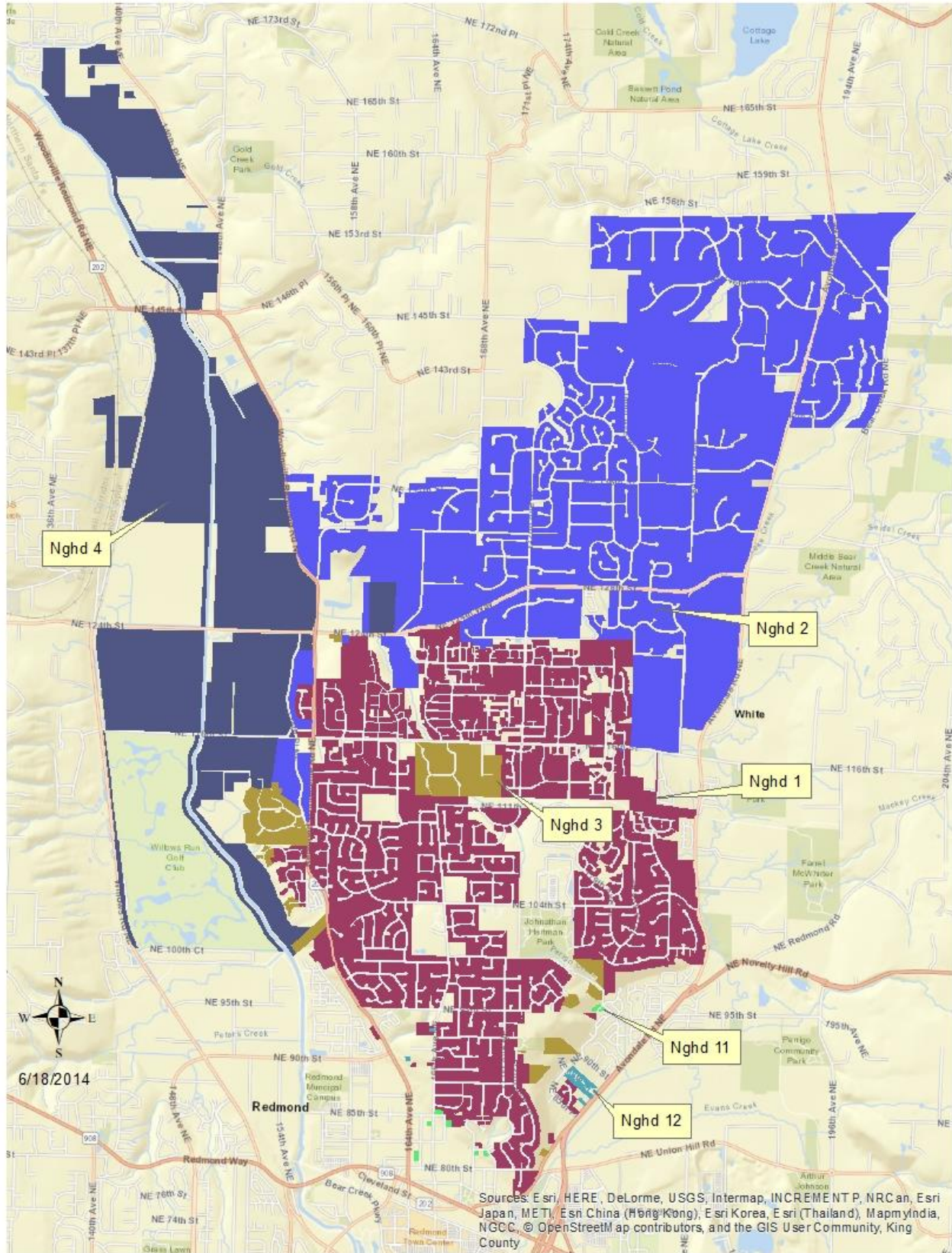
Area 072 Map

Area Information

Name or Designation

Area 072 - Redmond/ South Woodinville/ Sammamish Valley

Boundaries

Area 72-4 is defined by the boundaries of NE 155th St and the southern boundaries of the Hollywood Hill neighborhood (Area 36) to the north, Avondale Road to the east, and the City of Redmond border to the south, and Woodinville-Redmond Road to the west. Area 72-6 is defined by the boundaries of the City of Redmond border to the north, Avondale Way NE to the east, NE 80th St to the south and Woodinville-Redmond Road to the west. Area 72-8 is defined by the boundaries of Woodinville-Redmond Road to the east and Willows Road to the west. It extends north from the City of Redmond to the city limits of Woodinville.

Maps

A general map of the area is included in this report. More detailed Assessor's maps are located on the 7th floor of the King County Administration Building.

Area Description

For the purpose of land valuation, the area was divided into four distinct neighborhoods. Each Neighborhood was evaluated based on several characteristics, including location, zoning, typical use, and area sales.

Neighborhood 1 (Education Hill/North Redmond) includes parcels located within Redmond city limits. The typical zoning in this neighborhood is R4, R5, and R6, allowing for four, five, or six residential lots per acre, respectively. This high-density zoning encourages the subdivision of larger parcels into plats of specification built homes.

Neighborhood 2 (Bear Creek/English Hill) includes parcels located in unincorporated King County. The typical zoning in this neighborhood is R5 and R6, allowing for five and six residential lots per acre, respectively. There are also a number of RA2.5-zoned parcels, which are limited to one dwelling unit per 5 acres.

Neighborhood 3 includes parcels located within Redmond city limits. Neighborhood 3 differs from Neighborhood 1 in that the parcels are only zoned R1, allowing for one residential dwelling unit per acre. The density restrictions impacting R1-zoned parcels result in a downward land adjustment for parcels in Neighborhood 3 as compared to Neighborhood 1.

Neighborhood 4 (Sammamish Valley) includes mostly larger parcels located in the Sammamish Valley. Sammamish Valley is primarily an agricultural zone with many development restrictions. The typical zoning is A10, allowing for one residential dwelling unit per 10 acres, and UR (urban reserve), allowing for one residential lot per 5 acres, to accommodate medium to large working farms.

Two other neighborhoods, Neighborhoods 11 and 12, are also used to denote townhomes and duplexes.



Land Valuation

Vacant sales from 1/1/2017 to 12/31/2019 were given primary consideration for valuing land with emphasis placed on those sales closest to January 1, 2020. All land sales were field verified and researched using GIS mapping. An effort was made to contact buyers, sellers or agents involved in the transactions. Available sales and additional Area information can be viewed on the Assessor's website with [sales lists](#), [eSales](#) and [Localscape](#). Additional information may reside in the Assessor's Real Property Database, Assessor's procedures, Assessor's "field" maps, Revalue Plan, separate studies, and statutes.

The baseland schedule accounts for impacts that are common in a specific area. The baseland schedule provided is intended to value all tax lots and platted subdivisions in Neighborhoods 1, 2, 3, and 4. Neighborhoods 11 and 12 indicate duplexes and attached homes and followed the baseland schedule for Neighborhood 1.

Characteristics that were found to have the most influence on property values are topography, traffic nuisance, views, and environmental impacts such as wetlands. Properties considered unbuildable typically require documentation showing them to be non-developable. Unbuildable/non-developable sites may include, but are not limited to, those 100% impacted by environmental impacts, 100% impacted by significant topography, non-perc documentation on file, development rights sold, and/or no feasible access. Unbuildable parcels in Area 72 receive a significant reduction, depending on their estimated or observed potential for recreational or agricultural or other unimproved use.

Analysis of parcels of questionable development potential showed a typical reduction of 45%. "Questionable" parcels are parcels that face development challenges that include, but are not limited to, significant environmental impacts, lack of utilities and the challenges associated with bringing utilities to the parcel, and boundary lines and setbacks. A lack of available undeveloped residential land in Redmond, Sammamish, and Woodinville and analysis of land sales and development trends in the area show that taxpayers are still willing to overcome these challenges in order to capitalize on the full development potential of these questionable parcels.

There were a total of 5 vacant land sales available for analysis and development of the land valuation schedule. Due to the low number of raw, developable vacant parcels in the area, the Assessor also utilized sales of killed parcels, parcels with questionable development potential, parcels with open space exemptions, and parcels that were improved at the time of sale but were deemed probable-tear-downs. A typical, unimpacted half-acre lot in Area 72 has an average value between \$374,000 and \$532,000, depending on location. A 5-acre lot with no impacts or adjustments is valued between \$867,000 and \$3,036,000, depending on neighborhood location. Some large lots (≥5 acres) are valued at a per-site value, depending on the parcel zoning and perceived potential for subdivision. Per-site valuation amount accounts for number of potential sites, any land impacts that are present, and a standard -50% reduction for associated site development costs.

Land Model

Model Development, Description and Conclusions

The land model is composed of two components: the land schedule and the adjustments table. The land schedule was developed using vacant land sales, adjusted for different characteristics. The

adjustments table was developed through a matched-pair analysis of characteristics such as traffic, views, and linear waterfront footage. Improved sales were reviewed and supported the vacant sales analysis. Appraiser judgement was applied where an exception was warranted.

Improved Parcel Valuation

Improved Parcel Data:

Sales information is obtained from excise tax affidavits and reviewed initially by the Accounting Division, Sales Identification Section. Information is analyzed and investigated by the appraiser in the process of revaluation. All sales were verified if possible by calling either the purchaser or seller, inquiring in the field or calling the real estate agent. Characteristic data is verified for all sales if possible. Due to time constraints, interior inspections were limited. Available sales and additional Area information can be viewed on the Assessor's website with [sales lists](#), [eSales](#) and [Localscape](#). Additional information may reside in the Assessor's Real Property Database, Assessor's procedures, Assessor's "field" maps, Revalue Plan, separate studies, and statutes.

The Assessor maintains a cost model, which is specified by the physical characteristics of the improvement, such as first floor area, second floor area, total basement area, and number of bathrooms. The cost for each component is further calibrated to the 13 grades to account for quality of construction. Reconstruction Cost New (RCN) is calculated from adding up the cost of each component. Depreciation is then applied by means of a percent good table which is based on year built, grade, and condition, resulting in Reconstruction Cost New less Depreciation (RCNLD). The appraiser can make further adjustments for obsolescence (poor floor plan, design deficiencies, external nuisances etc.) if needed. The Assessor's cost model generates RCN and RCNLD for principal improvements and accessories such as detached garages and pools.

The Assessor's cost model was developed by the King County Department of Assessments in the early 1970's. It was recalibrated in 1990 to roughly approximate Marshall & Swift's square foot cost tables, and is indexed annually to keep up with current costs.

Model Development, Description and Conclusions:

Most sales were field verified and characteristics updated prior to model development. Sales were time adjusted to 1/1/2020.

The analysis of this area consisted of a systematic review of applicable characteristics which influence property values. Characteristics that indicated significance in the marketplace were determined to be land value, the age, condition, and grade of the improvement, and the reconstruction cost of the improvement. In addition to standard physical property characteristics, the analysis showed that properties in Sub Area 8, properties in unincorporated King County properties, duplexes and attached homes, and properties located in 4 distinct plats in Area 72 were influential in the market.

Sales Screening for Improved Parcel Analysis

In order to ensure that the Assessor's analysis of sales of improved properties best reflects the market value of the majority of the properties within an area, non-typical properties must be removed so a representative sales sample can be analyzed to determine the new valuation level. The following list illustrates examples of non-typical properties which are removed prior to the beginning of the analysis.

1. Vacant parcels
2. Mobile Home parcels
3. Multi-Parcel or Multi Building parcels
4. New construction where less than a 100% complete house was assessed for 2019
5. Existing residences where the data for 2019 is significantly different than the data for 2020 due to remodeling
6. Parcels with improvement values, but no characteristics
7. Parcels with either land or improvement values of \$10,000 or less posted for the 2019 Assessment Roll
8. Short sales, financial institution re-sales and foreclosure sales verified or appearing to be not at market

Highest and Best Use Analysis

As If Vacant: Market analysis of the area, together with current zoning and current and anticipated use patterns, indicate the highest and best use of the overwhelming majority of the appraised parcels is single family residential. Any other opinion of highest and best use is specifically noted in our records, and would form the basis for the valuation of that specific parcel.

As If Improved: Where any value for improvements is part of the total valuation, we are of the opinion that the present improvements produce a higher value for the property than if the site was vacant. In appraisal theory, the present use is therefore the highest and best (as improved) of the subject property, though it could be an interim use.

Standards and Measurement of Data Accuracy

Sales were verified with the purchaser, seller or real estate agent where possible. Current data was verified via field inspection and updated. Data was collected and coded per the assessor's residential procedures manual. In response to

the COVID-19 pandemic the Department of Assessments developed a policy intended to protect staff and citizens. This has impacted the Department of Assessments field appraiser's ability to directly engage the public in the field, making it difficult to confirm and validate some data changes. In cases where appraisers were not able to gain sufficient access to make determinations, aerial photography and public record data was relied upon.

We maintain uniformity with respect to building characteristics such as year-built, quality, condition, living area, stories, and land characteristics such as location (sub-area and plat), lot size, views, and waterfront. Other variables that are unique to the specific areas are also investigated. This approach ensures that values are equitable for all properties with respect to all measurable characteristics, whether the houses are larger or smaller, higher or lower quality, remodeled or not, with or without views or waterfront, etc.

Special Assumptions and Limiting Conditions

The sales comparison and cost approaches to value were considered for this mass appraisal valuation. After the sales verification process, the appraiser concluded that the market participants typically do not consider an income approach to value. Therefore the income approach is not applicable in this appraisal as these properties are not typically leased, but rather owner occupied. The income approach to value was not considered in the valuation of this area.

The following Departmental guidelines were considered and adhered to:

- Sales from 1/1/2017 to 12/31/2019 (at minimum) were considered in all analyses.
- Sales were time adjusted to 1/1/2020.
- This report is intended to meet the requirements of the Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice Standards 5 & 6.



Area 072 Market Value Changes Over Time

In a changing market, recognition of a sales trend to adjust a population of sold properties to a common date is required to allow for value differences over time. Market conditions prevalent in the last three years indicated that the best methodology for tracking market movement through time is a modeling technique using splines. Put simply, this is a way of drawing best fit lines through the data points in situations where there may be several different trends going on at different times. Splines are the use of two or more straight lines to approximate trends and directions in the market. Splines are best suited to react to the sudden market changes. To create larger and more reliable data sets for time trending, it was necessary in most instances to combine geographic areas that were performing similarly in the marketplace. The following chart shows the % time adjustment required for sales to reflect the indicated market value as of the assessment date, **January 1, 2020**.

For example, a sale of \$525,000 which occurred on April 1, 2017 would be adjusted by the time trend factor of 1.119, resulting in an adjusted value of \$587,475 ($\$525,000 * 1.119 = \$587,000$) – truncated to the nearest \$1000.

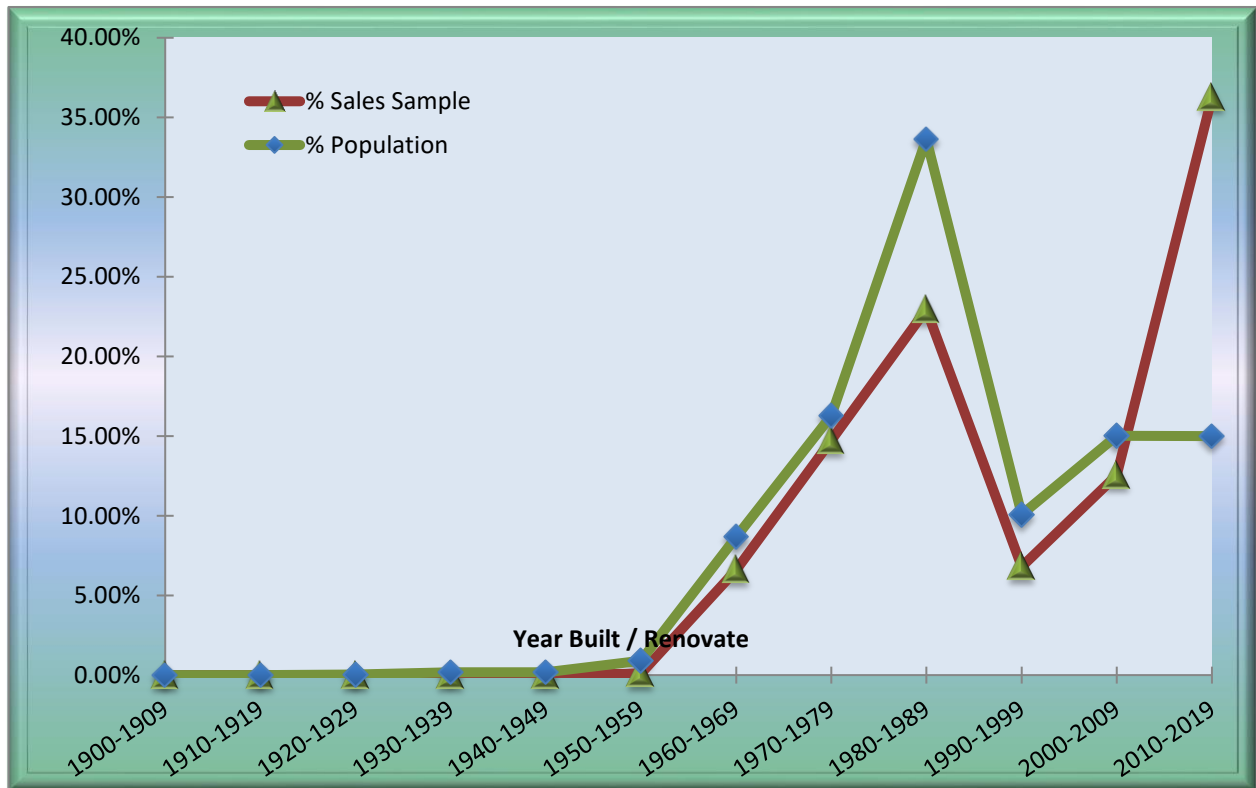

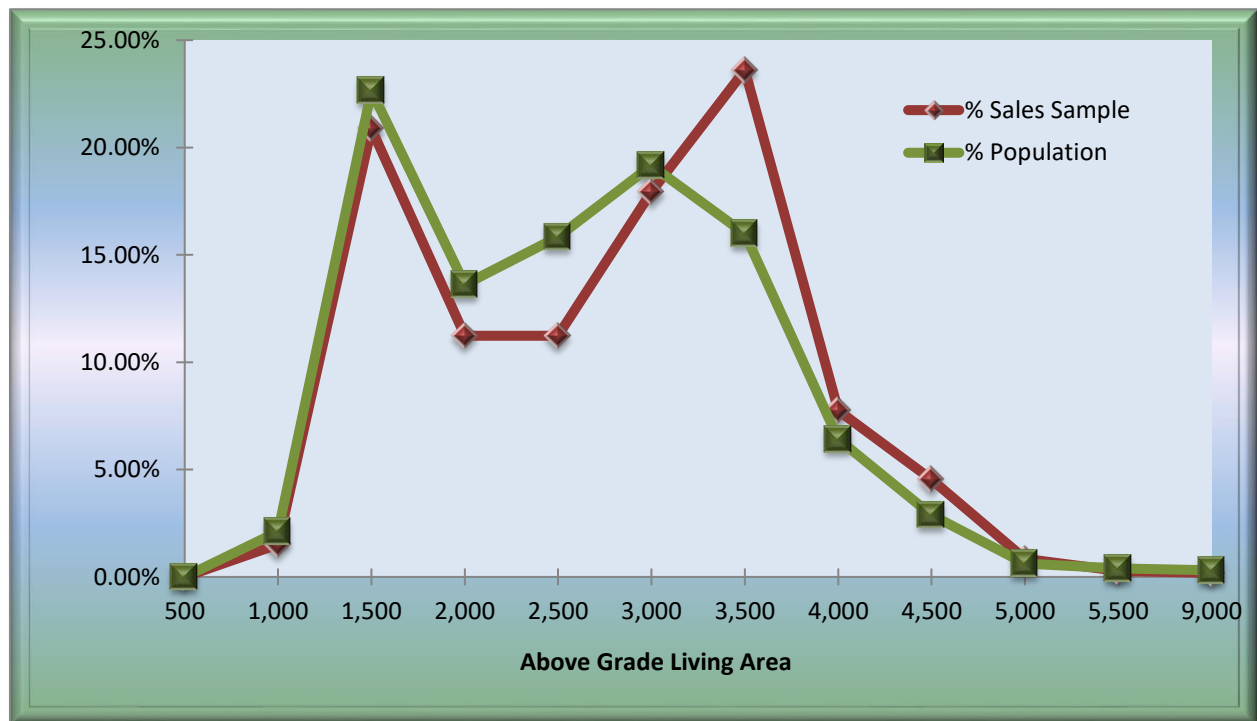

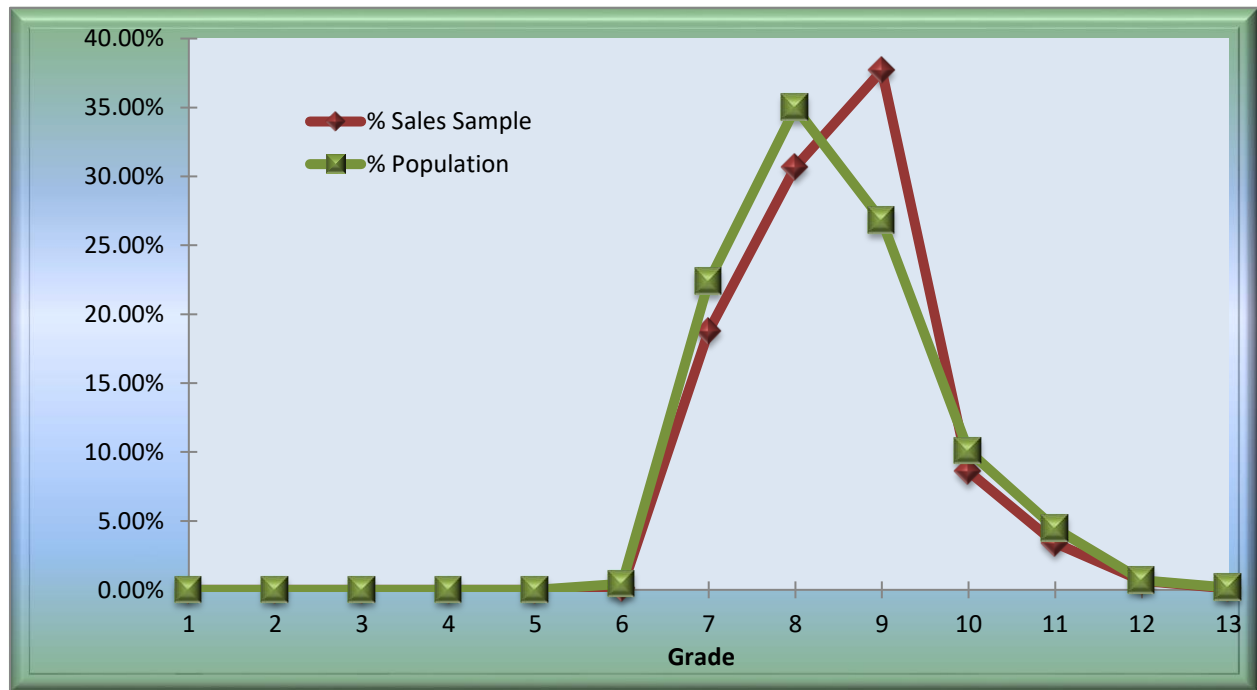

Results

Appraiser judgment prevails in all decisions regarding individual parcel valuation. Each parcel is field reviewed and a value selected based on general and specific data pertaining to the parcel, the neighborhood, and the market. The appraiser determines which available value estimate may be appropriate. This value estimate may be adjusted based on particular characteristics and conditions as they occur in the valuation area.

The assessment level target for all Residential areas in King County, including this area, is 0.90. The International Association of Assessing Officers recommends a range of 0.90 to 1.10. Due to rounding or other statistical influences the median for a particular area may be slightly above or below this target. The median assessment level for this area is 89.6% .

Application of these recommended values for the 2020 assessment year (taxes payable in 2020) results in an average total change from the 2019 assessments of -1.5%. This decrease is due partly to market changes over time and the previous assessment levels.

A Ratio Study was completed just prior to the application of the 2020 recommended values. This study benchmarks the prior assessment level using 2019 posted values (1/1/2019) compared to current adjusted sale prices (1/1/2020). The study was also repeated after the application of the 2020 recommended values. The results show an improvement in the COD from 7.29% to 5.82%.

The Appraisal Team recommends application of the Appraiser selected values, as indicated by the appropriate model or method.

This mass appraisal report is intended for use by the public, King County Assessor and other agencies or departments administering or confirming ad valorem property taxes. Definition and date of value estimate:

Market Value

The basis of all assessments is the true and fair value of property. True and fair value means market value (Spokane etc. R. Company v. Spokane County, 75 Wash. 72 (1913); Mason County Overtaxed, Inc. v. Mason County, 62 Wn. 2d (1963); AGO 57-58, No. 2, 1/8/57; AGO 65-66, No. 65, 12/31/65).

The true and fair value of a property in money for property tax valuation purposes is its "market value" or amount of money a buyer willing but not obligated to buy would pay for it to a seller willing but not obligated to sell. In arriving at a determination of such value, the assessing officer can consider only those factors which can within reason be said to affect the price in negotiations between a willing purchaser and a willing seller, and he must consider all of such factors. (AGO 65,66, No. 65, 12/31/65)

Retrospective market values are reported herein because the date of the report is subsequent to the effective date of valuation. The analysis reflects market conditions that existed on the effective date of appraisal.

Highest and Best Use

RCW 84.40.030

All property shall be valued at one hundred percent of its true and fair value in money and assessed on the same basis unless specifically provided otherwise by law.

An assessment may not be determined by a method that assumes a land usage or highest and best use not permitted, for that property being appraised, under existing zoning or land use planning ordinances or statutes or other government restrictions.

Any reasonable use to which the property may be put may be taken into consideration and if it is peculiarly adapted to some particular use, that fact may be taken into consideration. All property now existing, or that is hereafter created or brought into this state, shall be subject to assessment and taxation for state, county, and other taxing district purposes, upon equalized valuations thereof, fixed with reference thereto on the first day of January at twelve o'clock meridian in each year, excepting such as is exempted from taxation by law.

RCW 36.21.080

The county assessor is authorized to place any property that is increased in value due to construction or alteration for which a building permit was issued, or should have been issued, under chapter 19.27, 19.27A, or 19.28 RCW or other laws providing for building permits on the assessment rolls for the purposes of tax levy up to August 31st of each year. The assessed valuation of the property shall be considered as of July 31st of that year.

- Use all appropriate mass appraisal techniques as stated in Washington State Laws, Washington State Administrative Codes, Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice (USPAP), and accepted International Association of Assessing Officers (IAAO) standards and practices.
- Work with your supervisor on the development of the annual valuation plan and develop the scope of work for your portion of appraisal work assigned, including physical inspections and statistical updates of properties;
