1	A RESOLUTION supporting the inclusion of health-related
2	best practices in state standards for child care.
3	WHEREAS, there are approximately fifty-five thousand children in licensed child
4	care in King County, some of whom eat the majority of their meals and spend the
5	majority of their waking hours in care, and
6	WHEREAS, childhood and especially early childhood, which is ages zero to six,
7	is a critical time for the development of lifelong health habits, and research has shown
8	that children who have the benefit of healthy child care environments have better health
9	outcomes, and
10	WHEREAS, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Public Health
11	Association and the National Resource Center for Health and Safety in Child Care and
12	Early Education have developed "Caring for Our Children," the gold standard for best
13	practices on health and safety in child care, and
14	WHEREAS, these best practice standards recommend, among other things:
15	limiting screen time; providing healthy food and beverage choices; restricting access to
16	sugary drinks; providing active opportunities for physical activity; ensuring safe sleep
17	practices; eliminating exposure to secondhand tobacco smoke; adopting injury prevention
18	policies; ensuring communicable disease prevention; promoting breastfeeding; ensuring

infectious disease control; practicing integrative pest management; promoting oral health; 19 and ensuring overall quality of the outdoor and indoor environments, and 20 WHEREAS, in Washington state, child care is regulated and licensed by the 21 Washington state Department of Early Learning, which promulgates regulations that 22 establish standards for child care providers in family home settings, child care centers, 23 and before/after school care, and 24 WHEREAS, the Department of Early Learning is currently seeking input on 25 changes to the center-based and school-aged child care regulations in anticipation of 26 revising the standards therein, and 27 WHEREAS, the Department of Early Learning also has established the 28 Washington Quality Rating and Improvement System ("QRIS"), a voluntary program for 29 helping licensed child care providers offer high-quality care by receiving training and 30 incentives to move through five tiers towards national accreditation. The current QRIS 31 has a strong educational focus but includes few quality measures in any tiers that address 32 best practices in health. Because the Department of Early Learning intends to continue to 33 expand QRIS statewide, QRIS provides an excellent framework to expand provider 34 knowledge and adoption of best practices in health, and 35 WHEREAS, First Lady Michelle Obama has established Let's Move Child Care 36 promoting more physical activity, less screen time, healthier meals and beverages, and 37 breastfeeding in child care settings. Let's Move Child Care provides child care providers 38 with ideas and free resources to make their programs healthier. These resources include, 39 among other things, comprehensive guides, resource kits, webinars and sample menus; 40

41	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Health of King
42	County:
43	A. The Board of Health calls upon the Washington state Department of Early
44	Learning to adopt child care regulations that incorporate the best practices established by
45	Caring for Our Children.
46	B. The Board of Health calls upon the Department of Early Learning to expand
47	its Quality Rating Improvement System to include health-related best practices
48	established by Caring for Our Children, including providing healthy food choices,
49	restricting exposure to tobacco products, preventing injury and communicable disease
50	and promoting oral health and breastfeeding.
51	C. The Board of Health calls upon child care providers in King County to
52	participate in Let's Move Child Care and to work actively toward meeting the five
53	primary goals in order to safeguard and promote the health of the more than fifty-five
54	thousand children in their care and calls upon the Department of Early Learning to

- actively promote access to Let's Move Child Care information through its website, email
- list-serves and trainings with providers.
