Community Profile and Statewide Coordinated Statement of Need

MEDICAL MONITORING PROJECT

The Medical Monitoring Project (MMP) is a surveillance project designed to produce locally and nationally representative data on people living with HIV/AIDS who are receiving care in the United States. Washington state is one of 23 jurisdictions that are involved in MMP.

The Medical Monitoring Project (MMP) collects behavioral and clinical data from annual probability samples of HIV-positive adults receiving medical care in 23 areas -- including states, like Washington state, Puerto Rico, and local health jurisdictions. This report includes data from 517 interviews in Washington State conducted between 2015 and 2018. The 517 people interviewed were 43% of the 1,200 people living with HIV (PLWH) randomly selected over the three project years. The tables which follow give numbers of participants (raw or crude data) and percents of participants weighted to be representative of all PLWH, taking into account participation and other factors which may bias the raw data. With the percents are 95% confidence intervals to allow comparisons between groups. Some highlights of the demographics (**Table 1**) include:

- 51% of participants or PLWH were age 50 years and greater
- 57% were of non-Latinx White race
- 16% were born out of the U.S.
- 68% had more than a high school education

In **Table 2** demographics are broken down by federal poverty level (FPL) where striking differences in age, race/ethnicity, and education (as well as many other factors) are seen. For example, overall 34% are below federal poverty, but 62% of youth (18 to 29 years), 57% of Blacks, 50% of foreign-born, and 81% of people with less than a high school education had incomes below the FPL. **Table 3** presents sexual risk factors by viral suppression status: overall 28% did not have sustained viral suppression and 49% of those without suppression acknowledged having condomless sex with an HIV negative or unknown HIV status partner. Other tables give more details of demographics of condom and non-condom users (**Table 4**), or look at needs for ancillary services (**Tables 5a, 5b, 6a, 6b, 7a, 7b, 8a, and 8b**). These tables about service needs can be very useful to identify care gaps for HIV care and prevention planners. **Table 9** illustrates 95% and higher levels of satisfaction with HIV care by selected demographic characteristics. In **Table 10**, receipt of prevention services are summarized including that, in the last year, 52% of PLWH had received free condoms and 51% had received information on HIV prevention. The final table, **Table 11**, shows demographic characteristics of PLWH with and without sustained viral suppression, the percent with sustained viral suppression was markedly lower for some populations, including:

- 68% for persons age 30-39 years
- 68% for Blacks/African Americans
- 64% for women
- 66% for people with annual incomes less than \$20,000
- 56% for individuals who were homeless
- 51% for people with a recent incarceration
- 53% for people who injected drugs in the past year
