1. Key Indicators of COVID-19 Activity

In its <u>K-12 Schools 2020-2021 Guidance</u>, DOH recommends that in areas with high community transmission, middle and high school students use cohorting (grouping students) and at least three feet of distance between students <u>or</u> at least six feet of physical distance between students if cohorting is

not possible. The following chart includes King County data aligned with these indicators of high community transmission. The following data are current as of **April 22, 2021** and are regularly updated on the PHSKC COVID-19 data dashboard webpage.

2. Physical Distancing in Schools during High Community Transmission

DOH and CDC define 'high community transmission' as a 14-day COVID case rate greater than 200 per 100K residents or a test positivity rate higher than 10%. <u>Based on these our current metrics, King County is now in high community transmission</u>. This data is updated regularly and is <u>located here</u>.

DOH *recommends* that during periods of high community transmissions, one of the following occur in middle and high school settings:

- Students are in cohorts and maintain at least three feet of physical distance OR
- Students maintain at least six feet of physical distancing if not in cohorts.

Although the Healthy Washington Roadmap to Recovery phases use similar metrics to determine the reopening phase of Washington state counties, the CDC and DOH recommendations for K-12 Schools is independent of Healthy Washington determination. Schools should consider utilizing this recommendation when data indicates high transmission, regardless of Healthy Washington phase.

3. New Blog Post - Caution and Consultation are Key to Preventing Outbreaks in Schools

Wondering what happens when a positive COVID test comes back in a school setting? 4. Updated Masking Guidance from CDC – What does this mean for schools and child care providers?

On April 27, the CDC adjusted some guidelines on masks for fully vaccinated individuals in outdoor settings. These updates identify certain activities that fully vaccinated people can engage in relatively safely without wearing a mask. The full list of activities and guidelines can be <u>reviewed here</u>.

Despite these changes in general guidance from the CDC, DOH guidance for both K-12 schools and childcare settings continues to require universal masking of all students, staff and employees over age 5 while in school or child care. This requirement has not changed with the CDC updates.

5. Healthy Washington Guidance Documents for Schools

King County is currently in Phase 3 of Governor Inslee's <u>Healthy Washington</u>: <u>Roadmap to Recovery</u>. Healthy Washington Metrics will be reviewed again on May 3, 2021 to reassess current phase. King County's current <u>Healthy Washington</u> metrics can be found on Public Health's data dashboard, <u>located here</u>.

6. Vaccine updates

a. Getting vaccinated just got easier (at last!)

All Washington residents 16+ are eligible to be vaccinated *and vaccine supply is plentiful for the first time!* There are a number of options to find vaccine appointments – check out <u>Public Health Insider</u> for a complete list of options in King County, visit the <u>Getting Vaccinated</u> page, or Washington's <u>Vaccine Locator tool</u>, and check out the list of vaccination events below.

Pfizer BioNTech is the **only** vaccine approved for use in people who are 16 & 17 years old. The Moderna vaccine is approved for use in people who are 18 and over. The <u>Vaccine Locator tool</u> now includes the type of vaccine being provided so that 16 & 17 year old youth and their families can confirm the provider carried Pfizer BioNTech when scheduling.

Youth under 18 will need consent from a legal guardian to be vaccinated, unless legally emancipated. Check with the vaccine provider to ask if minors can attend their vaccine appointment unaccompanied by their consenting adult.

<u>Vaccination is free and available regardless of insurance, citizenship, or immigration status.</u>

 - c. Johnson & Johnson vaccine available again after safety review

Use of the J&J vaccine had been paused on April 13 as the CDC reviewed a small number of reports of a very rare condition involving blood clots and low platelet counts, mostly found in women ages 18 to 49. After a thorough review of the data, the CDC determined that the risk of this condition is extremely low. In contrast, the J&J vaccine provides strong protection from the much higher risk of hospitalization and death from COVID-19. Adults age 18 and older can get the Johnson & Johnson (J&J) COVID-19 vaccine.

i. GREEN RIVER COLLEGE VACCINE POP UP

Equity in Education Coalition's <u>pop-up</u> is currently pre-registering all individuals 16 years old and older. <u>THIS SIGN UP</u> is prioritizing BIPOC certificated and classified staff and students as well as international students.

Participants will automatically be scheduled for a second vaccine at Green River in 4 weeks.

ii. King County Public Health High Volume Vaccination Sites

King County's high-volume vaccination sites at Kent accesso ShoWare and the Auburn Outlet Mall are open for appointments to anyone age 16 and older. Register here for appointments Walk-in vaccination (no appointment required) is also available Monday - Saturday, 9 a.m.-4 p.m. 1000 walk-in vaccinations at each location daily.

You will be able to choose from either the Moderna/Pfizer vaccine or Johnson & Johnson vaccine.

The Kent and Auburn sites are ADA accessible and have ASL and language interpretation on site. If tactile interpretation is needed, please contact Seattle Deaf/Blind Service Center

iii. Shoreline Vaccination Site

To schedule, call <u>206-520-8700</u>, then press 0 between 7:30 a.m.-7:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Interpreters are available – say the language you need when connected.

iv. In-home vaccination

In-home vaccination is available for people age 16 and older who:

- Have not yet been vaccinated AND
- Have an injury, developmental disability or medical condition that makes it difficult to leave the home AND
- Would require considerable and taxing effort to get vaccinated outside the home

To request an appointment, call the King County COVID-19 Call Center at 206-477-3977, 8am-7pm. Interpretation is available. You will be asked a few questions to confirm you are eligible for in-home vaccination.

8. Please Share with Your Communities

a. Special Enrollment for Washington Health Care

The pandemic continues to rage on, harming not only our physical health, but also devastating jobs. Many people are finding themselves in sudden need to health insurance. There is now a <u>Special Enrollment Period for</u> free or low-cost insurance through Washington's Affordable Care Act health exchange – <u>Washington Healthplanfinder</u>. The enrollment period has been extended to August 15, 2021. The enrollment period is open to anyone who is currently uninsured. Public Health – Seattle & King County has a team of <u>Health Insurance Navigators</u> available to help answer questions and walk through the process of applying and selecting the right insurance plan. You can also browse plans and sign up directly through <u>Washington Healthplanfinder</u>.

b. Household and Food Assistance for Quarantine and Isolation

If you or members of your community need financial support to successfully isolate or quarantine, King County has two different programs available to support household bills and emergency food access.
