- 2. Understand how to register an AED in King County

- Cell phone loaded with Pulse Point AED
- Pulse Point brochures

ACTIVITY

1. DESCRIBE HOW AN AED WORKS

- An AED is a device that analyzes the heart's rhythm in a person suffering a possible sudden cardiac arrest. The AED looks for a certain type of abnormal heart rhythm that causes cardiac arrest and will correct this rhythm with a shock. The shock can be lifesaving.
- The AED will only deliver a shock if it is truly needed
- The shock may return the heart to a normal rhythm and normal function
- You don't need to be certified or take a course to learn how to use an AED. It is easy to use and designed to prompt you through its use

2. DESCRIBE AND DEMONSTRATE HOW TO USE THE AED

- Call 911 and continue compressions
- Turn on AED
- Expose patient's bare chest
- Apply pads according to pictures on the pads
- Follow AED prompts (when advised by the AED, clear the patient and stop chest compressions)
- Return to performing compressions after shock is delivered, or AED advises to restart CPR
- Continue with compressions until AED re-analyzes heart rhythm (about every two minutes) or the patient awakens



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3. OBSERVE PARTICIPANTS PRACTICE APPLYING AED PADS TO ADULT MANIKIN AND PROVIDE FEEDBACK AS NECESSARY

4. EXPLAIN AED REGISTRATION IN KING COUNTY

- Public AEDs must be registered with King County (RCW 70.54.310)
- The location of the AED will be provided to 911 dispatchers
- If there is an AED where the caller is located, 911 will tell them where to find it. This direction makes it easier for the caller to find the AED
- If you have an AED at work, school, place of worship, etc. you can register it at www.kingcounty.gov/aed

5. EXPLAIN PULSE POINT AED Mobile app

- People can download Pulse Point AED to report and update AEDs they see in the community
- Verified AEDs will be displayed in the app
- Demonstrate the Pulse Point app
- Hand out Pulse Point brochures
- 6. QUESTIONS

Adaptations for limited English/VPSI communities:

- Instructors teach lesson in native language of students
- Use Interpreters to assist with lecture portion of lesson plan
- Allow for additional hands-on practice with instructor observation and feedback
- Be aware of cultural norms around touching others while applying AED pads to patient
- Supplement with written materials in native language
- Some AEDs can be switched to give instructions in other languages



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
