Proposed Framework for the 2020-2025 Medic One/EMS levy planning process

The King County Medic One/EMS system is funded principally via countywide, voter-approved EMS levy. The current six-year (2014-2019) Medic One/EMS levy expires December 31, 2019. The region will need to develop a new Strategic Plan and financing plan (levy) to go before the voters in 2019.

OVERVIEW

- Levy planning begins approximately two years prior to the expiration of the levy.
- EMS Division will bring together regional Stakeholders and the <u>EMS Advisory Task Force</u> to collaboratively develop recommendations that become the next Strategic Plan and levy.
- All-inclusive, regional process that is rooted in partnerships and consensus-building.
- Will be modeled on the process used to plan the current levy (2014-2019).
- Approx 10 months to develop, finalize and obtain Task Force support for recommendations.

PROPOSED PROCESS

- 1. 20-member EMS Advisory Task Force
- Job is to oversee development and vetting of Medic One/EMS levies.
- Review and endorse broad policy decisions (aka recommendations) for the system:
 - Current and projected EMS system needs;
 - The Financial Plan based on those needs; and
 - The levy rate, levy length, and timing of levy ballot measure.

2. Subcommittees

- Will create 4 subcommittees, representing the 4 basic program areas, to conduct the bulk of the program and cost analysis. They will meet once a month.
 - Advanced Life Support (ALS, or paramedics)
 - Basic Life Support (BLS, or EMTs/first responders)
 - Regional Services/Strategic Initiatives (or core support services and pilots)
 - Finance
- Subcommittees to be chaired by EMS Advisory Task Force members.
- Subcommittees will consist of EMS Stakeholders and subject matter experts from all aspects of Medic One/EMS system.
- Subcommittees generate recommendations; Finance Subcommittee develops and reviews a financial plan to support these needs; Committees present to Task Force.

EMS Advisory Task Force Roles and Expectations

2020-2025 Medic One/EMS Strategic Plan & Levy Reauthorization Process

Background:

The current six-year (2014-2019) Medic One/EMS levy expires December 31, 2019. The King County Executive will propose putting a reauthorization of the levy (most likely for the span of 2020-2025) before the voters that same year. The EMS Advisory Task Force was created to develop "interjurisdictional agreement on an updated EMS strategic plan and financing package" for the 2020-2025 levy. The Task Force consists of 20 members from local and regional governments.

Objective of EMS Advisory Task Force:

The objective of the *EMS Advisory Task Force* is to review and propose Medic One/EMS program recommendations and the proposed levy rate to be put before the voters of King County. The recommendations will build upon the system's current medical model and regional approach, establish new policy directions, and present a financial plan to support the Medic One/EMS system through the span of the next levy.

Responsibilities include reviewing and proposing recommendations concerning:

- Current and projected EMS system needs;
- The Financial Plan based on those needs; and
- The levy rate, levy length, and timing of the levy ballot measure.

General Overview of EMS Advisory Task Force duties:

- 1. Endorse *EMS Advisory Task Force* operating rules and meetings schedule. Review duties. Review subcommittee development, approve membership and seek Chairs.
- 2. Review current vision, mission, objectives, principles and performances of the King Country Medic One/EMS system.
- 3. Review current and projected system needs required to maintain existing infrastructure of the Medic One/EMS system and its programs; review finances based on needs. Survey funding environment.
- 4. Endorse programmatic recommendations and Financial Plan; finalize EMS levy components of levy rate, length and ballot placement.
- 5. Develop interjurisdictional agreement on the recommendations for the updated EMS strategic and financing package for the 2020-2025 levy funding period.
- 6. Reach consensus.
- 7. Review and approve King County EMS Division-developed report of recommendations to be submitted to the King County Executive.

EMS Advisory Task Force Work Plan for the Levy Planning Process:

Developing the next Strategic Plan and funding package is modeled on the process that was used to plan the current levy (2014-2019). Four subcommittees, representing the Advanced Life Support (ALS), Basic Life Support (BLS), Regional Services (RS) and Finance program areas, will complete the bulk of the system program and cost analysis. Recommendations regarding current and projected program needs will be generated through the ALS, BLS, and RS subcommittees and subsequently presented to the *EMS Advisory Task Force*. A financial plan to adequately support these needs will be developed and reviewed by the Finance subcommittee.

The process has the *EMS Advisory Task Force* meeting four times, starting in January 2018 and concluding in October 2018. This will allow adequate time for the various subcommittees and the King County EMS Division staff to perform necessary analyses, prepare materials for *Task Force* review and deliberation, and subsequently report their recommendations in a timely manner to the King County Council.

The priority of the levy reauthorization is to ensure Medic One remains an adequately funded, regional tiered system, reflects the existing successful medical model, and continues to provide state of the art science-based strategies, programs, and leadership. The EMS Advisory Task Force will provide the forum for discussing these issues.

Steering Committee:

The Chairs of the four subcommittees and *EMS Advisory Task Force* will constitute a Steering Committee to review work conducted in subcommittees to ensure alignment with the overall goals of the planning process.

Subcommittees for the Levy Planning Process

Four subcommittees representing ALS, BLS, Regional Services/Strategic Initiatives, and Finance will conduct the bulk of the program and cost analysis. Each will be chaired by a member of the Task Force, and will consist of Stakeholders, subject matter experts, and other Task Force members. With the exception of Finance, each subcommittee will meet monthly; the Finance subcommittee will meet every few months to cost out the programmatic work developed by the other subcommittees.
