2020-2025 Medic One/EMS Strategic Plan & Levy Reauthorization Process

May 2018 update to the EMS Advisory Task Force

Overview:

The 2020-2025 Medic One/EMS levy planning process has been in full swing now for nearly four months, with the <u>ALS</u>, <u>BLS</u> and <u>Regional Services</u> Subcommittees meeting monthly to review system needs, regional interests, and identify efficiencies for the next levy span. As of May 2018, each of these Subcommittees has a list of items considered and decisions made, which are the beginnings of very draft programmatic and funding proposals. The <u>Finance</u> Subcommittee met on May 17 to review these very draft plans.

At its May 30, 2018 meeting, the *EMS Advisory Task Force* will be briefed on the draft proposals, and provide input on next steps.

The draft programmatic and financial proposals are based on the following:

ALS:

Findings:

- Minor adjustments to the unit allocation methodology will better ensure full funding.
- To protect the system, funds should be set aside as a "place holder" in the Financial Plan, should new units need to be added over the span of the 2020-2025 levy.

BLS:

Findings:

- Consolidating all BLS funding awards into a single allocation/contract will streamline and minimize the time, effort and administrative expense of administering BLS funding.
- Mobile Integrated Healthcare (MIH) is a regional priority and should receive funding from the regional EMS levy.

Regional Services/Strategic Initiatives:

Findings:

- Partners are committed to creating additional efficiencies and system effectiveness.
- The region supports programs and initiatives that increase standardization, coordination, interconnectedness and partnerships.
- Partners endorse a strong regional approach to address the needs experienced throughout all tiers of the EMS system.

Finance:

Findings:

- The Financial Plan should include adequate reserves to mitigate potential risks.
- Pursuing a 10 year levy would not benefit the system.

ALS Subcommittee Report for EMS Advisory Task Force (5/30/18)

(Endorsed at 5/8/18 ALS meeting)

Accomplishments to Date:

- Oriented to process, milestones, roles, responsibilities and expectations; endorsed Work Plan and ALS Subcommittee-specific principles for decision making.
- Reviewed the standard medic unit allocation, including its history, main components and issues experienced; compared costs and trends across agencies.

Principles leading the ALS Subcommittee:

- Maintain ALS as the funding priority
- ALS's primary focus is patient-centric
- Full unit funding will be made available
- Resources will be used efficiently
- Use data and sound practices in evaluating service needs
- Analyzed EMS system trends (Seattle & King County) and ALS demand projections to anticipate future demand including:
 - Specific criteria used in assessing medic unit need; and
 - Growth in population in comparison to call volumes and response times.
- ➤ Identified strategies to pursue to develop cost efficiencies and overall system effectiveness.

Recommendations made by the Subcommittee:

- 1. *Continue using the unit allocation* to determine ALS costs; slightly revise methodology to help ensure sufficient funding for program oversight & support:
 - a. Use <u>Unit Cost Allocation</u> to calculate direct paramedic services costs;
 - b. Use <u>Program Administration Allocation</u> to calculate costs associated with management and supervision of direct paramedic services; and
 - c. Use ALS System Cost Allocation to address highly variable costs.
- 2. **2020 preliminary baseline unit allocation is proposed at \$2,562,325**, and will be inflated appropriately over the span of the levy. This preliminary funding level will require further refinement.
- 3. *Set aside funds as a "place holder*" in the Financial Plan to protect the system, should new units need to be added over the span of the 2020-2025 levy.
- 4. *Identify appropriate levels of reserves* and contingencies for the next levy span.

Next Steps:

- 2. *Refine* the following and incorporate into Financial Plan:
 - baseline unit allocation;
 - placeholder costing scenario; and
 - reserves.
- 3. *Proceed with tasks* as directed by EMS Advisory Task Force at May 30, 2018 meeting.

BLS Subcommittee Report for EMS Advisory Task Force (5/30/18)

(Endorsed at 5/3/18 BLS meeting)

Accomplishments to Date:

- Oriented to process, milestones, roles, responsibilities and expectations; endorsed Work Plan and principles for decision making.
- Reviewed the history of BLS funding, the current funding formula, and programs that help reduce BLS impacts and address demand for services.
- ➤ Considered economic and demographic factors that could greatly impact the EMS system.
- Identified regional BLS priorities; discussed appropriate funding levels and mechanisms.
- Considered and proposed alternative BLS funding formula options to help address equity and need.

Principles leading the Subcommittee:

- The total BLS allocation should reflect the fundamental role that BLS plays within the regional system.
- Use data driven approaches to develop the BLS funding level.
- For determining the BLS funding methodology, keep it simple, equitable, stable and keep agencies whole.

Recommendations made by the Subcommittee:

- 1. *Consolidate all BLS funding programs* into a single BLS allocation.
- 2. *Continue using current methodology* to distribute funding to BLS agencies.
- 3. **Mobile Integrated Healthcare** (referred to as MIH) is a regional priority, and receiving **\$4 million annually** from the regional EMS levy would help it achieve its goals over the next levy span.

Next Steps:

- 1. **Resolve the following** for the BLS funding requests and incorporate into Financial Plan:
 - total BLS allocation funding level;
 - first year funding methodology (potential rebase); and
 - programmatic usage policies within the allocation.
- 2. **Determine** MIH funding methodology and usage policies.
- 3. **Proceed with tasks** as directed by EMS Advisory Task Force at May 30, 2018 meeting.

Regional Services Subcommittee Report for EMS Advisory Task Force (5/30/18)

(Endorsed at 5/15/18 Regional Services meeting)

Accomplishments to Date:

- Oriented to process, milestones, roles, responsibilities and expectations; endorsed Work Plan and Regional Services Subcommittee-specific principles for decision making.
- ➤ Reviewed the focus, costs and benefits of the Regional Services and Strategic Initiatives currently supporting the system through the 2014-2019 levy.
- ➤ Identified system needs, regional interests and priorities, and methods to increase cost efficiencies and provide greater overall system effectiveness.
- Developed an on-going list of ideas and considerations for future planning.

Principles leading the Subcommittee:

Decisions regarding programs and Initiatives will be viewed in respect to patient outcomes and high quality services. This includes:

- Collaboration with regional partners;
- Meeting emergent community needs;
- Maintaining and/or improving standards of patient care;
- Efficiently use resources;
- Improve system operations and contain costs;
- Ensure no degradation of services or the system;
- Maintain and/or identify new Strategic Initiatives that provide system effectiveness and efficiencies to
 - o Improve the quality of EMS services
 - o Manage the rate of growth
 - o Contain costs.

Recommendations made by the Subcommittee:

- 1. **Support the continuation, and development, of programs and Strategic Initiatives** that increase standardization, coordination, interconnectedness, and partnerships, using a strong regional approach via:
 - o The Vulnerable Populations Initiative;
 - o AEIOU Quality Improvement Initiative; and
 - o STRIVE EMS Online Modernization Initiative.

Next Steps:

- **1.** *Refine* expenditures and incorporate into Financial Plan.
- 2. *Proceed with tasks* as directed by EMS Advisory Task Force at May 30, 2018 meeting.

Finance Subcommittee Report for EMS Advisory Task Force (5/30/18)

(Endorsed at 5/17/18 meeting)

Accomplishments to Date:

- Oriented to process, milestones, roles, responsibilities and expectations; endorsed Work Plan and ALS Subcommittee-specific principles for decision making.
- Received financial orientation on the current economic environment facing the region; identified issues to be considered when developing the next Medic One/EMS levy.
- Reviewed historical Medic One/EMS financial information, including levy structure and rates, policies, and details of the EMS Financial Plans; discussed King County financial policies and main cost drivers.
- Compared expenditures associated with providing the *current* level of services and programs (referred to as <u>Status Quo</u>) through 2020-2025 levy span against expenditures associated with providing Subcommittees' "initial requests" (referred to as <u>Initial Proposed</u>).
- ➤ Addressed possibility of 10-year levy length.

Recommendations made by the Subcommittee:

- 1. *Incorporate sufficient reserves* into the EMS Financial Plan to help safeguard the Medic One/EMS system from unforeseen financial risk.
- 2. **Enacting a 10-year EMS levy** would **not ensure sufficient funding** for the system.

Next steps:

- 1. *Review new financial forecast* (available mid-July) to determine financial constraints and impacts on Subcommittee programmatic recommendations.
- 2. *Assess* next iterations of the ALS, BLS and Regional Services Subcommittees' *draft financial plans* and funding proposals.
- 3. *Determine reserve levels and policies* to mitigate potential risks.
- 4. **Proceed with tasks** as directed by EMS Advisory Task Force at May 30, 2018 meeting.

2020-2025 Medic One/EMS Strategic Plan & Levy Reauthorization Process

How amendments to RCW could impact levy decisions

Overview:

RCW 84.52.069 allows jurisdictions to levy a property tax "for the purpose of providing emergency medical services". Since the *Task Force* last met in January 2018, the approval and validation requirements of RCW 84.52.069 were significantly amended as follows:

1. Prior to being placed on the ballot, the levy proposal requires approval by the legislative authority of **75% of those cities with population exceeding 50,000**, and the King County Council.

As of May 2018, there are 11 cities, with the new ones in **bold**: Auburn, Bellevue, **Burien**, Federal Way, Kent, Kirkland, Redmond, Renton, **Sammamish**, Seattle and Shoreline

(Previously, RCW required approval of 100% of cities with 50,000+ in population.)

2. Requires a **simple majority vote** for passage. 2013 approval rating:

84%

(Previously, RCW required for passage an **approval rate of 60% or greater** at an election for which the **voter turnout must exceed 40%** of the prior general election.)

Policy Issue:

The overarching role of *EMS Advisory Task Force* is to review and endorse Medic One/EMS program recommendations and the proposed levy rate to be put before the voters of King County. Levy-specific issues to be discussed by the *Task Force* include determining the <u>levy length</u>, <u>rate</u> and <u>ballot timing</u>.

This second change to RCW mentioned above could impact the *Task Force's* decision regarding when to run the ballot measure.
