When performing bus shelter duties the worker installs, removes, and refurbishes public bus shelters. Assemblers, disassembles, and constructs bus shelter parts in workshop, and installs/removes shelters and shelter parts in the field. Works as part of a multi-person crew. On average, spends 75% of the week out of the shop, and 25% of the week in the shop.

Occasionally for up to 3 minutes at a time for up to 45 minutes total in a work shift while performing carpentry tasks and using a roto-hammer as well as manipulating locks, tool boxes, ladders, and tool kits.

Carrying 11-20 pounds
