of Membership, which is given in recognition of outstanding performances by his team.

Tahoma is first to earn green schools district award

Tahoma School District's success in recycling and resource management has earned recognition as the first school district in King County to attain Level One in the Green Schools Program.

Dale Alekel, King County Green Schools Program manager, presented a framed certificate to Tahoma Superintendent Mike Maryanski May 20 in recognition of the district's achievement.

"Tahoma School District's eight schools have done a terrific job engaging students and staff in learning about and practicing conservation," Alekel said. "The district and its schools provide a model for other schools and districts."

Level one of the program focuses on waste reduction and recycling. Schools

that complete level one have reduced waste and set up effective programs to recycle paper, bottles, cans and other

materials. Three schools also have achieved level two status, which focuses on energy efficiency.

Five of the district's eight schools recycle their food scraps and food-soiled paper, which Cedar Grove Composting facility collects and composts. Glacier Park Elementary, the first school in the district to add organics collection, increased its recycling rate from 10 percent to 68 percent. Due to increased recycling and decreased garbage volumes, the school saves the district an average of \$7,000 annually. During the past two years, the entire school district has reduced waste by nearly 25 percent and has saved about \$25,000 annually on garbage disposal. The district also has reduced paper usage.
