



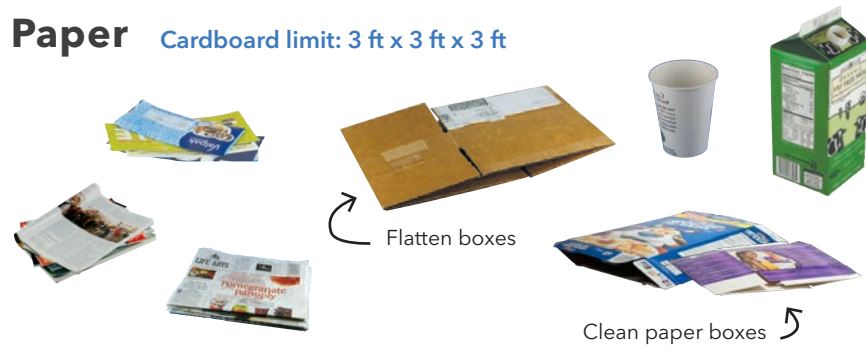
# Recycling & Composting Guide

## RECYCLE

- Empty, clean and dry items
- Labels are okay
- Do not bag recyclables

### Paper

Cardboard limit: 3 ft x 3 ft x 3 ft



### Plastic

Lids 3" or larger can be recycled on their own. Lids smaller than 3" are garbage. Plastic caps of all sizes can be recycled when screwed onto bottles.



### Glass



### Metal

Metal items limit: 2 ft x 2 ft x 2 ft

Keep these items out of curbside recycling and compost bins

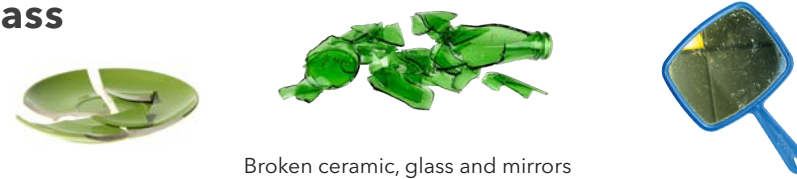

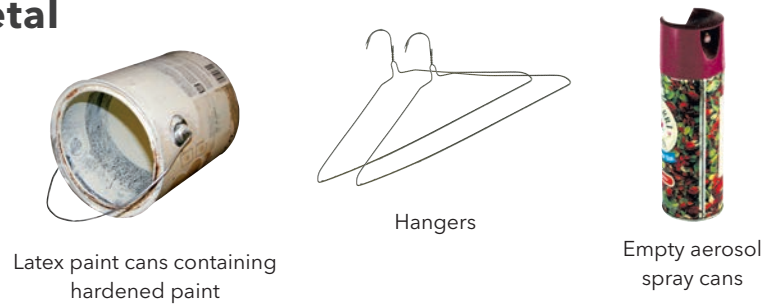

### Plastic Bags and Plastic Wrap

- Reuse plastic bags
- Use reusable shopping bags
- Return plastic bags and plastic wrap to a retail location near you: [plasticfilmrecycling.org](http://plasticfilmrecycling.org)
- Put used plastic bags and plastic wrap in the garbage

### Electronic Devices

No disposal of these electronic products in the garbage. Donate or take them to an eCycle Washington location.



### Appliances and Other Large Furniture

Appliances and furniture can be repaired or donated for reuse. If not functional, dispose of at transfer stations.



### Medical Sharps and Other Waste From Home Medical Care



### Unwanted Medicines

Dispose of unwanted meds at a nearby drop-box.



### Batteries and Mercury-Containing Products

Many types of batteries and all mercury-containing products are prohibited from disposal in the garbage and at county transfer stations.
