Meeting called to order by Chair Kevin Scott-Vandenberge at 6:03 pm

Roll Call/Announcement of Staff & Public (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge) Roll call of Commissioners and announcement of staff and public guests was done via Zoom's chat function.

ACTION: Approval of Meeting Agenda (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge) Darron Marzolf motioned to accept the agenda as-is. Janet Keller seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

ACTION: Approval of December 2021 Meeting Minutes (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge) Darron Marzolf motioned to accept the minutes as-is. Henry Wong seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Public Comment – Related to Specific Agenda Item (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge) There was no public comment given during this period.

Old Business – Updates

- Commission Details/Agriculture Policy & Events (Patrice Barrentine):
 - King County's C-PACER program has launched. It is intended to support businesses in upgrading facilities to be more energy- and water-efficient. More information is available at <u>KingCounty.gov</u>.
 - Commission Re-Appointments: Darron Marzolf, Roger Calhoon, and Kevin Scott-Vandenberge's reappointments are complete. Lily Gottlieb-McHale's still awaits King County Council (KCC) action.
 - o New Commission Appointees: All new appointees are now fully confirmed.

- KC Comprehensive ("Comp") Plan 2024 Update: Between now and June is the scoping process for the everyeight-years major update of the KC Comp Plan. There will be much work ahead for the Commission on issues affecting agriculture; more in formation will come in February.
- January 3, the KC Growth Management hearing board made a final ruling on the adult beverage ordinance. An appeal has already been filed. More information will come in February.
- The state legislature's plan for a hybrid (virtual and in-person) session has been adjusted to be more virtual, due to developments concerning the Omicron strain of COVID-19.
- SB 5727, one of several bills introduced at request of Governor Inslee, is moving through the legislature. This bill would mandate planting/maintenance of riparian buffers for lands adjacent to water bodies key to salmon recovery. The Governor's request stems from concern that voluntary methods are not working to recover salmon populations. Currently, bill language is unclear in how agriculture may be affected. The bill will likely mandate one fixed buffer width for all, and require counties and cities to amend comprehensive plans and codes to adhere to the new law. There remains uncertainty in many specifics, including how the legislation would address non-priority watersheds, enforcement, exemptions, and funding/costs. The bill is planned for full implementation by 2032. Washington Association of Counties has already submitted a letter of strong concern. A companion bill, HB 1838, will be heard before committee next week. Leann Krainick and Patrice Barrentine offered to send out more information on the bills.
- Selection Committee (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge): Five nominees for the Commission have been sent to DNRP leadership and await a reply. Spring recruitment deadline is end of May; all past applicants are asked to re-apply.
- King County Agriculture Program (Richard Martin): Bee Cha, the County's farm manager, is nearing the end of a three-year term with the County in May. At that point, the position will need to be backfilled. A Request for Proposal for a contractor with project management experience is being developed. Funding is available to support a contractor working half-time for six months. Patrice Barrentine will send out more information in coming weeks.
- King Conservation District (Carrie King, via e-mail):
 - Four candidates are running for seat #2 in KCD's election. A postcard mailer will come in the next few days. Voting runs January 18 to February 8. Ballots can be submitted online, by postal mail, or drop-off at specific locations. More information is at <u>https://kingcd.org/about/board-of-supervisors/elections-and-appointments/</u>.
 - KCD's <u>native plant sale</u> has nearly sold out in record time, with just nine species remaining. Order pickup is March 12-13 at the Tukwila Community Center.
 - The Regional Food Grant Program is exploring a grant partnership with the state Conservation Commission on irrigation efficiency projects in the Cedar-Sammamish watershed, a first for KCD.
 - KCD is working with KC DNRP on the next set of strategic initiative investments for value-added products for food and farming, and for climate resiliency-related infrastructure projects.
 - KCD is launching 17 grant projects with the County, related to: infrastructure improvements, new farmer trainings, community agriculture projects, and other agricultural/community support efforts.
- Local Food Initiative (Richard Martin): A feasibility report finished in December to identify market needs for a food entrepreneurship center to be built in Kent. This would occupy 30,000 sf of production space for six to seven primary occupants, with Fair Start as anchortenant. Its focus is to provide space and infrastructure to support food, food manufacturing, and food processing businesses that support local food industry. The project is set to launch mid-2022. Patrice Barrentine will send out a link with more information.

• King-Pierce Farm Bureau (Leann Krainick):

- More information will come soon about the above-referenced buffer plantings-related legislative bills.
- The "My Fork Supports Farms" social media campaign is in full swing. Any information on agriculture policy should be sent to Leann Krainick.
- KPFB scholarships are available for associate members or higher pursuing agriculture studies as a high school senior or through a college degree in agriculture. Applications are due in April.
- KPFB will hold an in-person meeting next week in the Sumner area, open to all members.

• Farm Fish Flood 2.0 (Richard Martin):

- FFF project lead Beth leDoux has taken a temporary position elsewhere in KC DNRP; it is unknown if she will return to the FFF position. Backfilling is underway for high-priority tasks, with Joan Lee at DNRP taking lead.
- Bobbi Lindemulder has agreed to serve as FFF farm caucus chair, following Marie Shimada's departure.

New Business/Presentation: Farming and Wildlife - Beavers (Jen Vanderhoof, DNRP)

Jen Vanderhoof, Senior Ecologist in DNRP WLRD's Science section, presented on impacts of beavers on agriculture. Benefits include increased water storage as well as groundwater supply and water quality improvements. Challenges mostly relate to land use, such as dams contributing to flooding and water backup, and felled trees.

Vanderhoof then reviewed methods to address beavers on private land, related permitting concerns, and several beaver resource documents in development by the County. Video of the presentation is available on line <u>here</u>. Vanderhoof encouraged anyone with concerns about beavers and agriculture to reach out; contact information is available, along with other beaver resources, at <u>http://www.kingcounty.gov/beavers</u>.

ACTION/New Business/Policy Review: Green River Alternatives to Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement [PEIS] (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge, Patrice Barrentine)

KC's Flood Control District is developing a Flood Hazard Management Plan (FHMP) to address likely increased future flooding in the heavily urban Lower Green River corridor. The plan would guide investments to reduce flooding. A Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (PEIS) is underway. The PEIS is a study to analyze ways to provide flood protection and meet other objectives. Three alternative courses for the draft PEIS are proposed, with a public feedback period on these alternatives, and any additional impacts that should be considered, ending February 4. More information on the PEIS and FHMP is online at http://www.lowergreensepa.org.

Commission discussion concurred that agriculture impacts should be considered in development of this plan, and more specific information is needed. Patrice Barrentine showed two videos from the above-linked Lower Green SEPA website to provide overview and specifics for the three alternatives. Barrentine then reviewed a draft letter for the Commission to officially comment on the PEIS, soliciting feedback on the draft. It was generally agreed that the Commission opposes Alternative 1 due to its lack of proactive planning action; it was also suggested that farmers in the Lower Green corridor should provide input on this process, and the Commission receive an in-depth presentation on it.

A point was raised that this comment period specifically seeks feedback on which of the three proposed alternatives to pursue, thus the Commission's letter should be two-part in its approach: address the feedback being sought, then layer on any Commission concerns about what is wanted from this process. Due to the fast-approaching comment deadline, Kevin Scott-Vandenberge asked how to fast-track the letter for transmittal. Patrice Barrentine reviewed the options.

ACTION: Andrew Ely motioned to form a special Commission committee to take on the responsibility of formalizing a draft of this letter to be sent by a February 3 deadline. Shelley Pasco seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously. Ely, Pasco, Jordan Jobe, and Scott-Vandenberge agreed to serve as special committee for this letter.

2022 Commission Planning (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge, Patrice Barrentine)

Kevin Scott-Vandenberge directed Commissioners to review the 2022 topics calendar attached to the meeting packet. Commissioners should let Scott-Vandenberge and Patrice Barrentine know which topics should be looked at further, as well as gauge their interest in participating in Commission committees.

Public Comment – General (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge)

Dane Scarimbolo, local brewery owner, spoke on the above-referenced adult beverage ordinance ruling and importance of small businesses in rural areas, particularly for revenue. KC Roads' budget is declining, with sustainability likely to end by 2025, perhaps sooner due to the pandemic. Scarimbolo said 3.2% of retail sales occur in rural areas, with King County being the lowest in Washington state in encouraging small businesses in unincorporated areas. Lack of small businesses, and inability to retail their products, Scarimbolo continued, means declining in frastructure. Scarimbolo said 100% of the 1% sales tax in unincorporated areas goes to the County, but only 15% of that 1% goes to unincorporated KC if a sale occurs within city limits. Scarimbolo voiced frustration that no one is hearing these concerns; Kevin Scott-Vandenberge acknowledged them and agreed to take them to the Commission's Executive Committee. Scarimbolo also provided a link to information on KC's <u>Urban Unincorporated Community Investment Committee</u>.

Concerns of Commissioners (Kevin Scott-Vandenberge) There were no concerns voiced by Commissioners during this period.

Under the newly adopted timeline, the payroll deduction will start in July 2023 with benefits beginning in July 2026



- Inslee's legislation calling for wide strips of vegetation along waterways crossing farms and other rural private property has not received a hearing in the Senate and stalled in the House Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee.

Dear Ms. Clark:

The King County Agriculture Commission was established to provide guidance and advice to the King County Executive and Council on issues that affect agriculture in King County. We want to take this opportunity to provide some initial comments to the King County Flood Control District (FCD) during the scoping process for the Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (PEIS) for the Lower Green River Valley.

The Lower Green River Corridor project area includes one of King County's five Agricultural Production Districts (APD): Lower Green River APD. APDs are specifically identified in the King County Comprehensive Plan as critically important resource areas where agriculture is the primary land use. The Lower Green River APD is an extremely important region for local food production and supports some of King County's most valuable agricultural soils. Farms in the PEIS study area are primarily market farms that sell directly to the public from their farm stands or through several of the 40 farmers markets in King County. In addition, one of the largest vegetable growers in the County is in this study area; primarily selling to mainline regional grocery stores and a critical element of the local food economy. Lastly, King County owns three farms in the study area. Those farms are central to the County's ESJ and Local Food Initiative's goals by supporting beginning and historically underserved (BIPOC) farmers to ensure the future of farming in King County.

The materials released by the FCD in support of the PEIS scoping effort identified three primary alternatives. Because issues related to flooding and land protection are best addressed at a landscape scale, the Agriculture Commission is opposed to Alternative 1, which does not require development of an area-specific Flood Hazard Management Plan and addresses projects on a case-by-case basis. In contrast, Alternatives 2 and 3 include collaborative development of an area-specific Flood Hazard Management Plan and examine projects from a regional perspective. We are, however, concerned that protection of agriculture is not highlighted as one of the most important community and environmental objectives since the study area includes the APD. While we understand and support efforts to restore habitat along the river, farmland preservation must be explicitly identified as a goal, especially farms within the APD and farms protected

through King County's Farmland Preservation Program. We request that proposals for siting flood management features on or near farmable land be carefully considered and include recommendations to mitigate for the degradation of any component of the working farmland system (including currently farmed land, fallow farmable land, irrigation and drainage systems, transportation and agritourism access, etc.), and that potential projects seek to improve farmland systems. Similarly, upgrading 100-year flood protections to 500- year flood protections for the project area will alter flooding in the Green River Valley, and may include significant infrastructure projects. Protecting farmland and farmland function by explicitly assessing the potential impacts to farmland in regard to the depth of flooding, flow rates, and timing will be critical to farms. The impacts of the construction and placement of flood reduction infrastructure in the floodplain on or near agricultural lands should be considered when developing and designing projects.

The commission looks forward to reviewing the completed PEIS and is available to answer any questions you may have about the agricultural needs in the study area while completing the PEIS. The Commission also respectfully requests that when there are large-scale Flood Control District proposals that potentially affect farmland, such as this PEIS, that a representative of the District provide a briefing to the Commission very early in the process to give Commission members an opportunity to discuss the proposal in some detail. This would be in addition to the normal public outreach efforts that the District typically coordinates.

In an effort to begin better communication and input from the commission, we respectfully request an update on the PEIS process at the commission's March 10, 2022 meeting, or as soon as can be arranged.
