Dembowski's Equity and Social Justice Legislation and Reforms

- Introducing legislation to sponsor civilian oversight charter reforms for Sheriff's Office.
- Co-sponsored the ordinance that placed a charter amendment on the ballot in 2015 that strengthened OLEO's authorities, and authored a key provision of the amendment to place negotiating authority for oversight with the County Executive, rather than with the Sheriff
- Only Councilmember to <u>publicly object to new sheriff's contract not including use of</u> force investigatory authority.
- Supports charter amendment for subpoena power to Office of Law Enforcement Oversight.
- Supports charter amendment for appointed Sheriff with <u>strong community input</u>.
- Authored an <u>op-ed with Seattle City Council President Harrell on the failures of the</u>
 <u>Children and Family Justice Center</u> and called for a rethinking of the design and plan of the youth jail.
- Collaborated with <u>communities and stakeholders to push for design alternatives to the Children and Family Justice Center to consider innovative models for responding to youth in crisis.</u>
- Banned the use of <u>solitary confinement for youth in detention in King County</u>.
- Led <u>budget initiative</u> to invest in community bail reform.
- Partnered with Councilmember Larry Gossett to expand the County's civil rights work with the formation of a new King County Human and Civil Rights Commission.
- Included subpoena power in enhanced <u>Human and Civil Rights Commission</u> authority.
- Sponsored the <u>King County Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation Inclusion Task Force</u>, to develop a recommended countywide inclusion strategy and work plan to help ensure that all people are accurately and respectfully recognized and served.
- Unfurled the first ever pride flag from the King County Courthouse.
- Founded a nationwide effort to build a coalition of county officials, resulting in 69
 county officials from 37 jurisdictions across the U.S., submitting a letter to Congress
 calling on national leaders to swiftly and comprehensively address the Deferred Action
 for Childhood Arrivals program.
- Partnered with <u>Councilmember Larry Gossett to create a King County Immigrant and Refugee Commission</u> to integrate, strengthen, and value immigrants and refugees and uphold the county's commitment as a welcoming community.
- Passed legislation requiring the creation of an implementation plan for the <u>2020 Census</u> to ensure the complete count of all King County residents prioritizing those considered Hard-to-Count
- Secured \$780,000 in funding for the Response, Awareness, De-escalation and Referral (RADAR) program, which builds a bridge between law enforcement and mental health professionals when responding to incidents involving individuals who are experiencing a mental health crisis, suffering from substance abuse, or struggling with homelessness, connecting them to the proper services.

- Ran an amendment to provide the <u>Department of Public Defense with the</u>
 independence needed to be able to advocate for system reforms in the criminal justice
 system.
- Co-sponsored legislation that prevents the use of <u>County funds and resources to aid</u> federal immigration enforcement and protects immigrants and refugees who seek services from the County.
- Authored legislation creating the <u>Ruth Woo Emerging Leaders Fellowship</u>. This year-long fellowship annually places five recent college graduates from disadvantaged backgrounds in various county agencies for periods of three to four months at a time.
- <u>Commemorated Gordon Hirabayashi</u>, for his conscientious resistance to the unjust, forced removal of Japanese American citizens, with the installation of a plaque just steps away from where he was incarcerated for nine months in the King County jail
- Served on the Harborview Leadership Group to ensure Harborview's mission population is prioritized to receive quality care and services in the next bond's capital recommendations.
