DCHS completed a countywide survey of shelters, day centers, encampments, and supportive housing programs to identify resource gaps and needs.

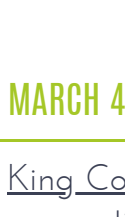


FEBRUARY 27, 2020

The first confirmed case of COVID-19 is observed in King County.

FEBRUARY 29, 2020

The first death due to COVID-19 in a resident of King County



The person who died was a man in his 50s with underlying health conditions who had no history of travel or contact with a known COVID-19 case.

This enabled "extraordinary measures" to fight the outbreak like waiving some procurement protocols, authorizing staff overtime work, and other powers.

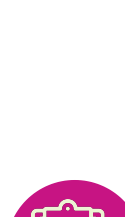


MARCH 1, 2020

Executive Constantine signed a Proclamation of Emergency in response to COVID-19.

MARCH 2, 2020

DCHS, PHSKC and City of Seattle convene weekly strategy calls with 200+ providers.



Included were homeless services, health care, supportive housing, city planners, coalitions, and faith communities to present up-to-date information on COVID-19 and respond to questions.

With increasing number of COVID-19 cases, King County residents limit social contacts to minimize the spread of COVID-19 in the community.



MARCH 4, 2020

King County bought a hotel in Kent to quarantine COVID patients.

MARCH 6, 2020

DCHS conducted first trainings on CDC guidelines for shelter sanitation and hygiene.



The Centers for Disease Control guidance was designed to train and prepare homeless services staff in Homeless Shelters and Day Centers.

"Treat the next two weeks as a period of self-quarantine, to protect yourself and the lives and health of your loved ones and the entire community."

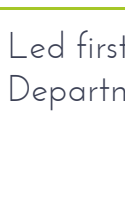


MARCH 8, 2020

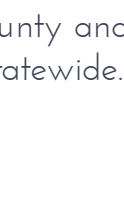
With City of Bellevue, created 80 spaces to de-intensify the Eastside's largest shelter site.

MARCH 10, 2020

Kent Isolation and Quarantine site was opened only six days after purchase!

MARCH 10, 2020

King County, City of Seattle and United Way pooled their resources of bleach, hand sanitizer, gloves and other sanitation supplies into one place.

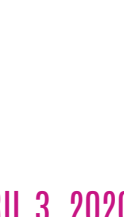
Opened a COVID supply "store" in a King County warehouse for service providers.

MARCH 13, 2020

WA State orders schools to close until April 24 as well as issue a ban on large events.



DCHS opens 24/7 shelter space in the King County International Airport for 80 older adults to de-intensify one of the county's largest shelters.



MARCH 16, 2020

State orders no gatherings over 50 and closes restaurants, bars, clubs, theaters, and fitness.

MARCH 24, 2020

Aurora Isolation and Quarantine modular facility opens with first guests.

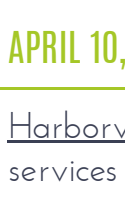


MARCH 24, 2020

Led first COVID Response Webinar with U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

MARCH 25, 2020

First 100 deaths recorded in King County and nonessential businesses close statewide.



King County and Seattle expand emergency shelter and housing response to create additional space and a range of temporary housing options.

What to Expect in Isolation and Quarantine



MARCH 29, 2020

Issaquah Isolation and Quarantine site opens as safe place from vulnerable family.

MARCH 31, 2020

Executive transmits emergency legislation to fund childcare services for first responders.



Approved unanimously by Council, \$2.2 million in unspent Puget Sound Taxpayer Accountability Account funding to provide childcare to families of first responders and essential workers.

In effort to slow the coronavirus and prevent transmission through the homeless population, King County negotiated with three hotels to serve as temporary shelter locations for people experiencing homelessness.



APRIL 2, 2020

King County reduced shelter concentrations by moving nearly 400 people to hotels.

APRIL 3, 2020

Launched transport of guests to quarantine with specially retrofitted Metro vehicles.



Metro's Transportation for Pandemic Response

Temporary sobering and recovery shelter opens at Recovery Café with 40 beds and 24/7 case management for people a place to sleep off intoxication and access recovery services. Schools closed statewide through 2020.



APRIL 6, 2020

Five pallets added to Chief Seattle Club's Eagle Village to increase housing options.

APRIL 10, 2020

Rental assistance fund launched. \$5 million to help low income individuals and families.



This fund is a collaboration between King County, United Way of King County, Seattle Foundation and the City of Seattle with help families economically harmed by COVID-19.



APRIL 10, 2020

Harborview Hall site opens with COVID-19 services for homeless intensive health needs.

APRIL 12, 2020

Shoreline Assessment and Recovery Center opens with Kaiser Permanente services.



King County and City of Shoreline Transform Soccer Field

DCHS moves about 100 people from shelter sites to hotels in Queen Anne neighborhood in Seattle.



APRIL 24, 2020

DCHS and Seattle coordinate and launch new emergency childcare for essential workers.

MAY 1, 2020

New analysis shows COVID-19 is disproportionately impacting communities.



Data on cases, hospitalizations and deaths by race and ethnicity shows that rates of confirmed COVID-19 cases for Hispanics, Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders is four times that of Whites.

Isolation and quarantine sites had 46 people staying in centers, latest data shows COVID-19 transmission rate could be rising in King County.



MAY 8, 2020

DCHS offers quarantine services at remaining three sites as the Shoreline AC/RC closes.

MAY 14, 2020

Elliott Avenue modular pilot project offers shelter beds and services to fight COVID-19.

MAY 22, 2020

No new cases of COVID-19 reported among people experiencing homelessness.

MAY 30, 2020

DCHS and Public Health staff film the "Stay Home, and Slow the Spread" PSA



86 crew members of an American Seafoods trawler have tested positive for COVID-19, according to a press release from the seafood company.

King County helps stranded crew members from a fishing boat with COVID-19 outbreak.



JUNE 1, 2020

Food for Communities in Need by VSHSL wraps up after providing services in April, May

JUNE 1, 2020

King County committed to being intentionally anti-racist and accountable to Black, Brown, and Indigenous People of Color with a goal of the proposed 2021-2022 policy agenda and budget to meet the needs of and implement positive changes within communities.

JUNE 11, 2020

King County declared racism a public health crisis to equitable community response.



DCHS provides 100 training slots to events aimed at helping Black communities impacted by intersection of the COVID-19 pandemic and racism of widespread police violence.

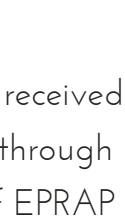


JULY 11, 2020

Mental Health Day dedicated to Black communities dually impacted by COVID-19.

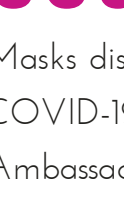
JULY 24, 2020

King County Executive Dow Constantine released his annual State of the County address.

AUGUST 5, 2020

DCHS designs, recruits and launches the new COVID Health Ambassador Program.

AUGUST 20, 2020

Executive announces new \$41 million Eviction Prevention and Rent Assistance Program.



"Many people are facing serious challenges due to COVID-19 and the loss of health or income, leaving them extremely vulnerable to eviction. This emergency program will forestall the loss of housing and prevent homelessness for thousands of residents in need across King County."

The SoDo site open to provide about 80 people with healthy air and shelter. Shifting wind patterns caused the dense smoke produced by the wildfires in Oregon and California to move into Western Washington, creating unhealthy to very unhealthy air quality.



SEPTEMBER 11, 2020

The SoDo site provided healthy air and shelter 24/7 for 80 people daily during the smoke crisis.

SEPTEMBER 14, 2020

First pool of applicants assisted through the Eviction Prevention and Rent Assistance Program.



The program reached out to individual tenants, large and small property managers and landlords, and mobile home parks. Funding was prioritized for the highest-need areas and residents as well as access in 27+ languages.

SEPTEMBER 22, 2020

Executive announces Health through Housing Initiative in 2021-2022 Proposed Budget Speech.

SEPTEMBER 29, 2020

DCHS designs and launches COVID relief Child Care Assistance Program in 22 languages

The County received feedback that essential workers and other families continue to have difficulty accessing and affording child care, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. For some families and child care providers, this has been exacerbated by virtual learning.

King County Council approves "unprecedented funding" for Health through Housing Initiative.

OCTOBER 7, 2020

University of Washington/King County study shows effectiveness of hotel shelter response.

OCTOBER 13, 2020

King County Council approves "unprecedented funding" for Health through Housing Initiative.

About 4,500 people are considered chronically homeless in King County, according to the Homeless Domestic and Sexual Violence, Legal Services to Prevention Eviction and Foreclosure and Emerging Needs.

Over \$4.8 million disbursed by Adult Services Division Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF).

FEBRUARY 1, 2021

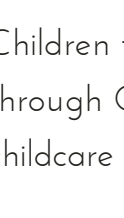
Two mass vaccination sites for COVID-19 opened in South King County.

FEBRUARY 1, 2021

DCHS worked with over 120 organizations since June across the four program categories: Food Security, Domestic and Sexual Violence, Legal Services to Prevention Eviction and Foreclosure and Emerging Needs.

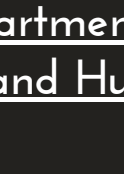

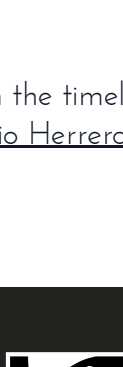
