Collection where feasible	Yardwaste (BL,CF,E, SH), wood (BL, E, SH) metal ((BL,E, SH, V), cardboard (all except A, Fac)
Recovery	Recovery of wood, metal, cardboard at Shoreline, Enumclaw
Expand collection	Additional materials - Styrofoam, mattress, tires at new and existing facilities where there is capacity
New infrastructure	Yardwaste, wood, metal, cardboard at Factoria, SC, NE
Education	
County outreach	Low level outreach to self-haul customers
County outreach	Enhance education with self-haul customers
Staff and Support training	Train all SWD staff on recycling to enhance interaction with self-haul
Ban Education	Develop station by station education campaign for ban
Mandatory Requirements	
Ban Phase 1 materials	Wood, organics, curbside materials, metal
Ban Phase 2 materials	Mattress, carpet, asphalt shingles, tires as stations come on line
