- Start and end dates Methods Background Results
- 2. What are the positive impacts of this project on student learning?
- 3. What are the positive impacts of this project on the environment?
- 4. How do the benefits of the project extend beyond the classroom to the greater student body, the school district or the community?
- 5. For a nominated person, tell how the nominee demonstrates a commitment to the environment beyond the normal requirements of his or her job.

Answers should be brief, but should provide enough detail to fully describe the project and its impact. Submit no more than two typed pages. Be sure to attach the nomination form to your response.

Nominate an Earth Hero in one of these categories:

Teacher - A teacher who has introduced students to the importance of preserving and protecting the natural environment through an innovative and creative program or project.

Staff/Volunteer - A school staff person or volunteer who has taken the initiative to implement a program/project that educates students about the value of protecting the environment.

Student - A young person who has shown leadership in educating his/her peers about the importance of protecting the environment.

Program/School - An innovative or creative project or program in a school that educates and teaches students about the value of the environment; a school that is dedicated to building an environmental legacy for future generations.

NOTE: 2007 winners are not eligible for the 2008 award. However, they may be nominated again in 2009.
