Description of Activities for 2022:

- **Board Listening Session on the King County Customer Service Center.** The Board held a community listening session as part of the May 2022 Board Meeting. Staff from the King County Customer Service Center presented plans to make the future Customer Service Center at the King Street Building accessible to people with disabilities. Members of the Board and community shared strategies to ensure the future Customer Service Center would be accessible to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their caregivers.
- **Board Recruitment and Retention.** The Board Chair and staff began weekly meetings in 2022 with time devoted to Board recruitment and retention. Board recruitment and retention have become an issue as several challenges related to virtual meetings and virtual community engagement opportunities have been identified as barriers to Board Member recruitment and retention. The focus on Board recruitment and retention led to the development of a plan to restructure Board meetings in 2023 to address barriers to Board recruitment and retention.
- Planning to Restructure Board Meetings and Events in 2023.
 - Throughout the fall of 2022, the Board engaged in a planning process to address challenges related to Board accessibility and community engagement. At the December 2022 Board Meeting, plans were shared for restructuring Board Meetings in 2023. Beginning in 2023 the Board will implement several changes to Board Meetings to include Hybrid Board meetings, moving meeting times to early evenings, and holding quarterly events to increase Board meeting accessibility and community engagement.
- Continued Availability of ASL interpretation and Closed Captioning. In efforts to increase Board meeting accessibility, 2022 marked the first full year that ASL interpretation and closed captioning became a standing feature of each monthly Board meeting.

Description of Board Activities During 2022:

EMAC welcomed incoming Chair Kimberly Behymer from the City of Kent, and new Vice-Chair Neil Crosier from King County Department of Metro Transportation at the beginning of 2022. A road map for priorities and the vision of 2022 was discussed and set to guide the year. The following are key activities:

- The by-laws were reviewed and updated to account for changes in the King County statute throughout the first months of the year.
- EMAC suggested/requested EOC training courses at the beginning of the year. KCOEM provided 6 "EOC 101" course videos (4 currently scheduled 2 more to be published before the end of the year), and, as the videos were released throughout the year, links and updates were provided to EMAC members.
- Two new members for the newly added City of Federal Way seats were provided onboarding paperwork and welcome information.
- The Critical Infrastructure workgroup assisted in the writing, development, and presentation on liquid fuel distribution plan as mandated by the Department of Commerce for each HLS region.

- Members of EMAC participated in and heard reports from the IEMC grant development workgroup.
- Two new KCOEM staff members were introduced to the committee, including the new EMAC lead Lexi Swanson and the new exercise and assessment coordinator, Debbie Hunt.
- A vision for the future of EMAC post COVID was discussed with the incoming chair Neil Crosier to discuss opportunities for deeper engagement in the coming year.

At each meeting, members were given updates on SHSP and UASI grant funding, including new projects and the spend out rate of open projects. Members were encouraged to participate in building projects for both grants and identifying gaps in the SPR/THIRA. Each meeting also included updates from the Zone liaisons on occurrences and work around the county.

EMAC continued to work to include partners and stakeholders in its work and meetings to incorporate the whole community to better drive involvement in the development of regional work. Members were encouraged to share relevant updates during good of the order to encourage situational awareness and partner involvement or input. To assist with this prompting, prior to good of the order, KCOEM shared relevant updates from our office including federal updates, procedural updates, staff changes, and training opportunities. This approach continuously assisted in defining roles, contacts, responsibilities, and opportunities within King County's work in emergency management.

- Tanya Matthews, WAB Chair spoke at the Women's History Month sponsored by Council Member Khol-Welles to inform and bring awareness to the WAB. WAB members Sarah Reyneveld, D3 and Rebecca Chan, D1 each testified at two separate King County Budget meetings.
- Nanda Tewari was appointed as a new board member for D3
- The WAB met with over 30 contributors to form their 2022 Reccomendations for King County Council. These contributors included a diverse group of leaders from KC providers, DCHS, staff and members from the community. These meetings were conducted both during WAB meetings and through individual member outreach.
- The WAB drafted a Gender Based Violence Community Request Letter to the King County Executive in support of survivors of gender based violence requesting to increase Mental Illness and Drug Dependency (MIDD) funding by 2 million a year, as well as requesting an additional 4-6 million in Veteran, Seniors and Humans Services Levy (VSHSL) dollars.
- The WAB completed their 2022 recommendations to Council and is set to host a meeting in January for Councilmembers, contributors and community members to present the proposed recommendations.
