# Some History...

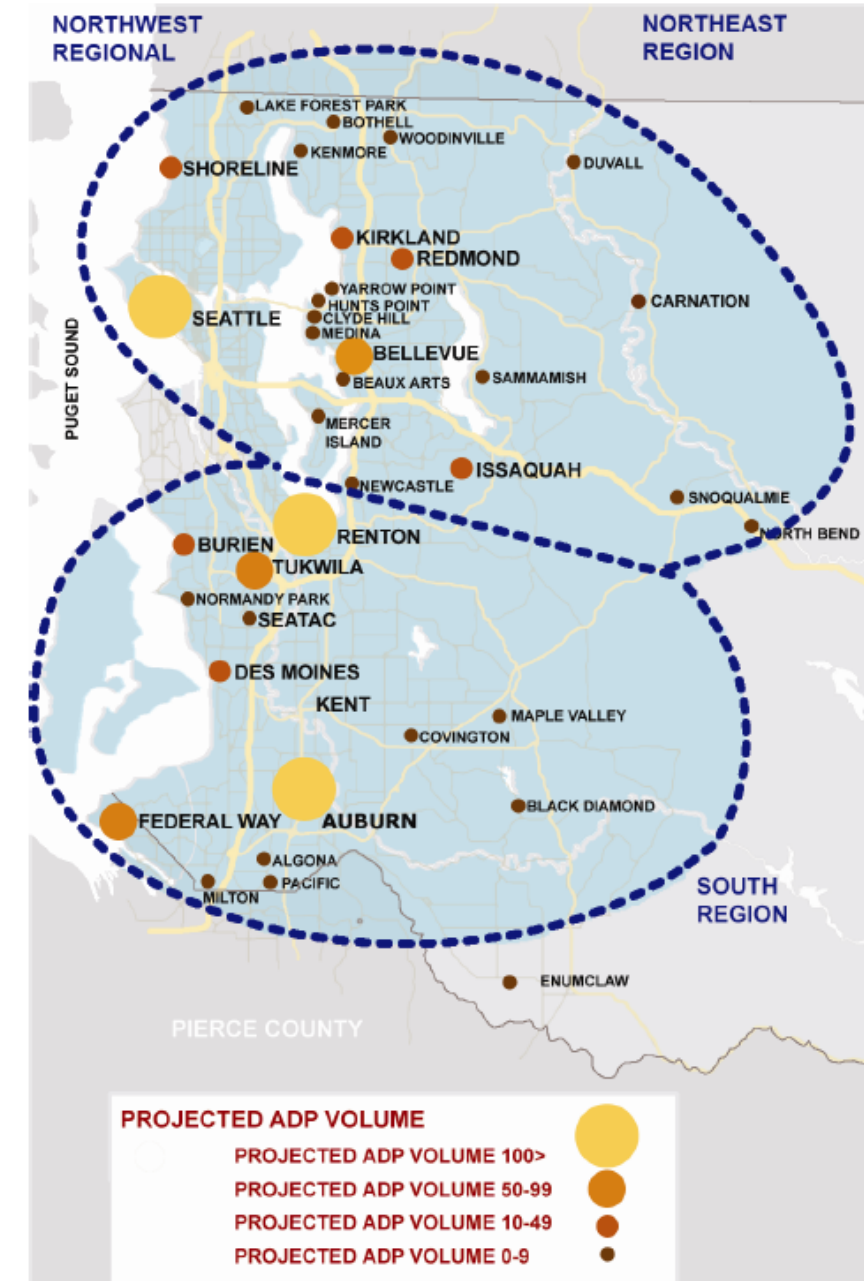
King and Yakima Counties put area cities on notice they will not continue to contract with local cities for misdemeanants beyond 2012 and 2010 respectively.

2005 – The Jail Administrative Group (JAG) was formed in response and long range jail planning was initiated.

JAG Hired Ricci-Greene to analyze local jail population needs and capacity options over the next twenty years. They analyzed north and south regional needs.

Note: Although costs and jail options were studied; projected staffing and operational costs for medical/mental health populations were not analyzed.

# Some History Continued...

## 2006 - Cities complete the Ricci-Greene Study

- Ricci-Greene report indicates that 39 cities in King County will need 1,440 beds by 2026.
- Of those beds, 700+ will be needed in South King County region.

## 2007 - Cities joined together for the SCORE Feasibility Study

## 2008 - Cities agree to form SCORE - Design and Finance work begins

## 2009 - Cities locate site, obtain building permit, complete design, issue bonds, and start construction.

2010 - Construction continues and operations planning begins

2011 - SCORE Opens

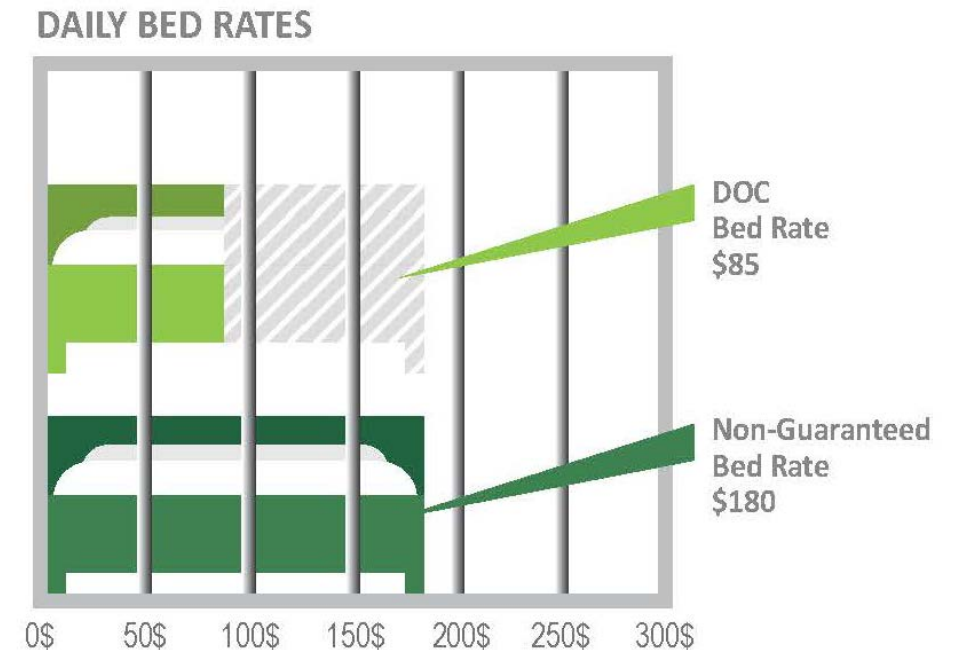

## Length of Stay

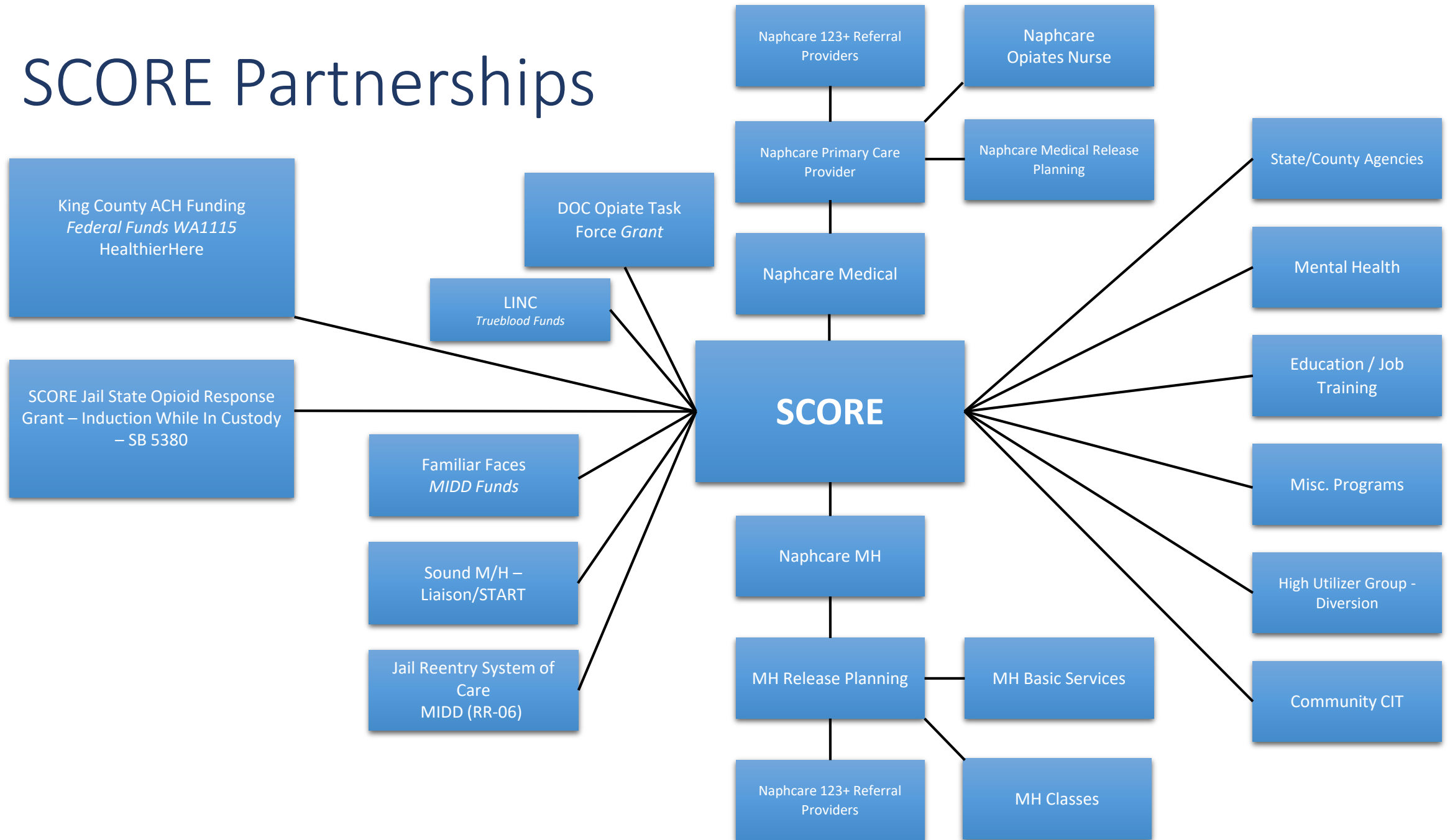
- Average length of stay is 8 days

- Worried about DOC reporting

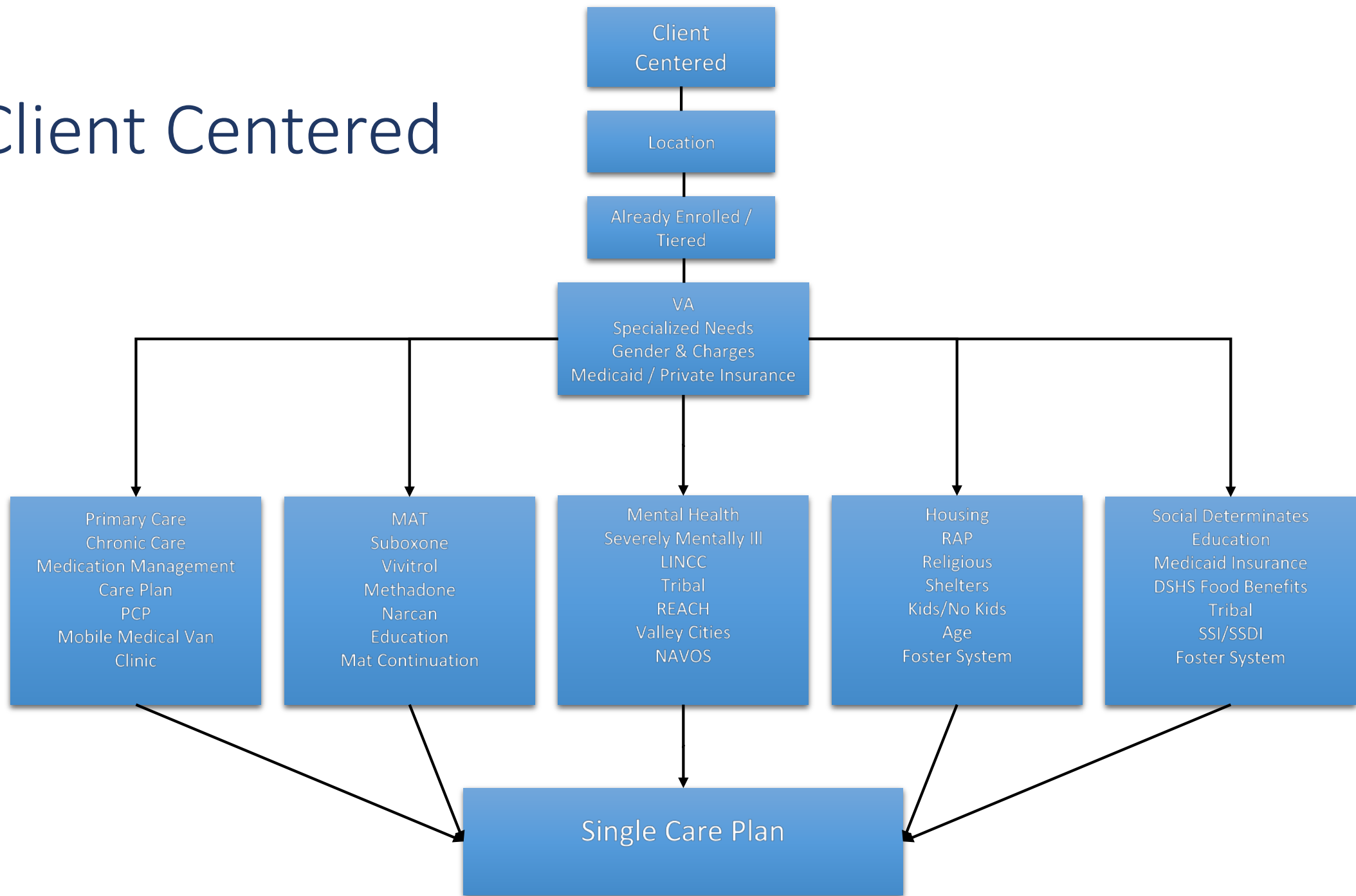

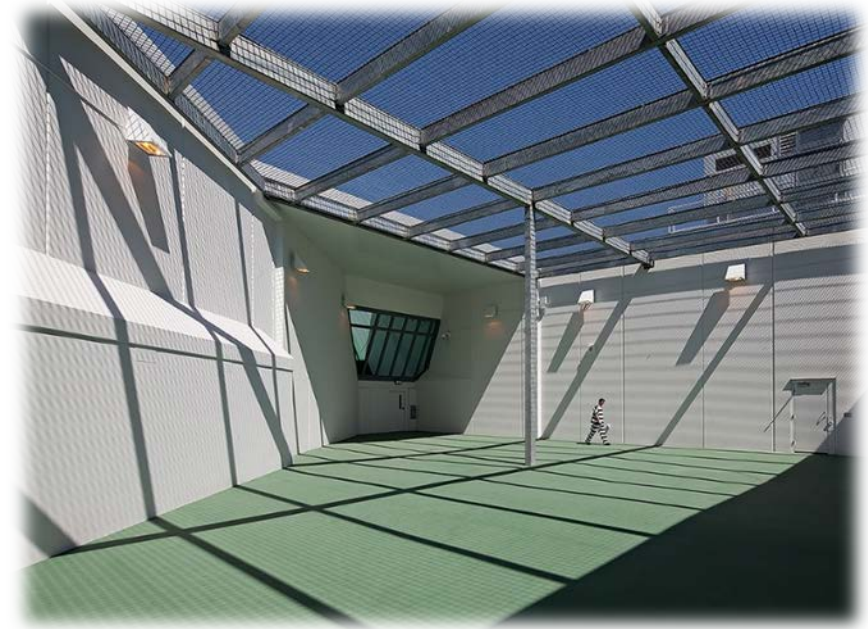

# What works

- SCORE has eliminated barriers access
- Bringing the services to the client where they are and when they need them (In-Reach)
- Whole Person Care
- Relationships with Partner Providers
- Change and adapt to what is needed
- Leverage our resources





# Investing in Reentry



- Emergency Utilization
  - Average 2.7 Visits per year (26,000 Bookings per year)
  - Most for 1 Person is 199 in 12 Months
- Identified through EDIE(Emergency Department Information Exchange).
- Severe substance use and mental health disorders.
- Consistently refused to engage
- Treatment Team! (Medical, Mental Health, SCORE and Sound Health, Medical Assisted Treatment and Housing Support).
- No New Bookings in over a year.

# In 2018...

- Substance Use
  - 79% are detoxing
  - 60 % are detoxing from opiates
  - Average 35 – 60 detoxing per day
- Mental Health
  - 60% have a mental health disorder



# WA State Opioid Response (SOR) Project



## Washington State allocation

- \$21.6 million per year for Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery Support Services
- \$7.6 million per year is allocated for Opioid Treatment Networks
- Year 1 funding awarded (1/2019 to 9/29/2019)
- Year 2 funding pending (9/30/2019 to 9/29/2020)
- SCORE Funding per year \$363,000

## State Opioid Plan and SOR

- Address Goal 2 of the State Opioid Plan (Identify and treat opioid use disorder)
- Strategy 2.2 –Establish access in every region of the state to the full continuum of care for persons with opioid use disorder.
- Enhance MAT access to specialized and underserved communities
- Engage current and potential MAT prescribers
- Eliminate standard “treatment gap” by facilitating direct referrals and care coordination for ongoing MAT with Local MAT Treatment Sites.

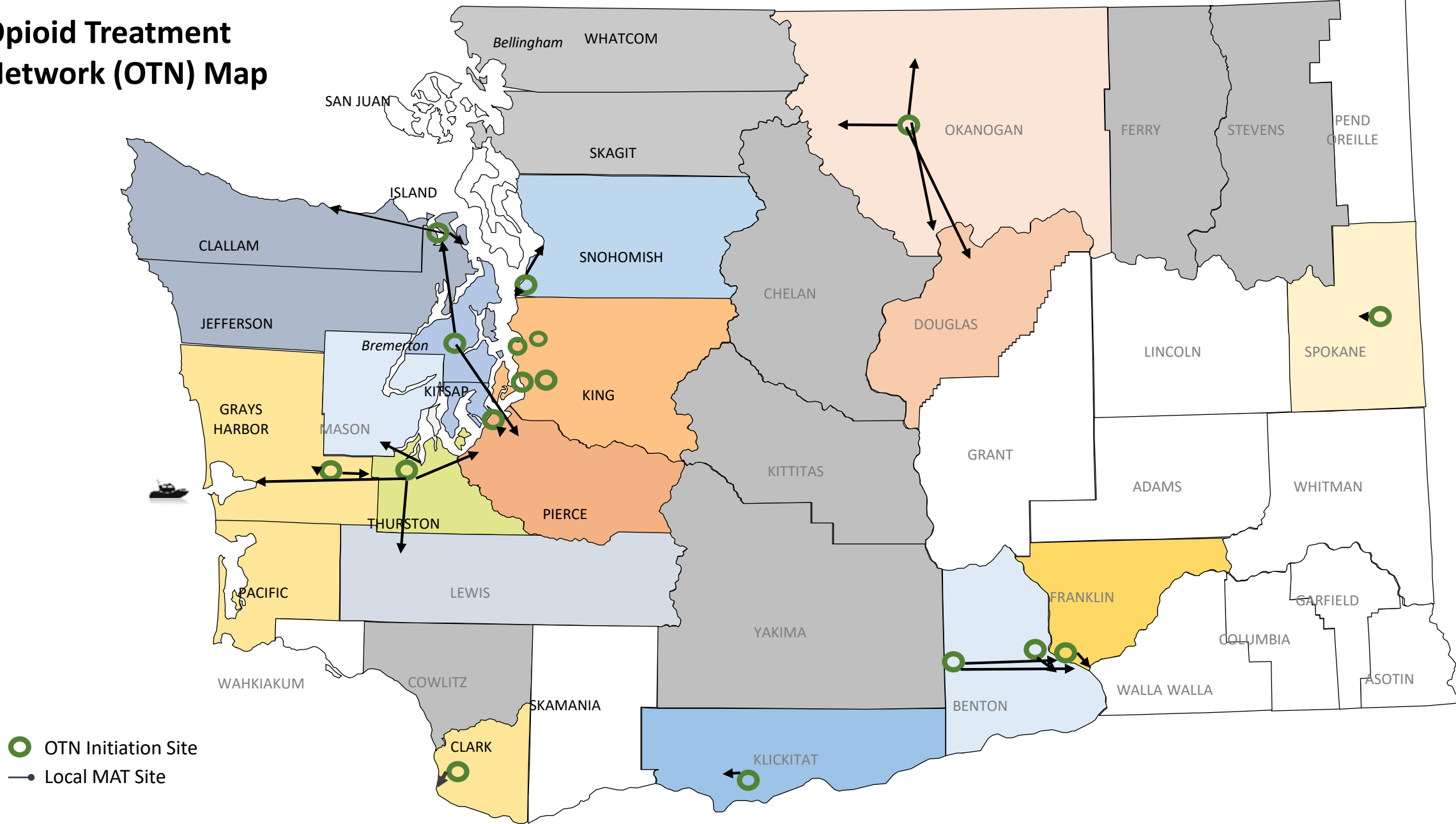
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## Opioid Treatment Network Background

- Hub & Spoke (H&S)
- OTNs are 2nd Generation H&S—more flexible
- Use of Care Navigators to connect people to treatment
- Reach people at high risk for overdose
- Meet people “where they are...”
