### 1. Key indicators of COVID-19 activity

The following chart includes King County data aligned with key indicators of COVID-19 activity outlined in the <u>Decision Tree for Provision of In Person Learning among K-12 Students at Public</u> and Private Schools during the COVID-19 Pandemic released by the Washington State Department of Health (DOH). The following is data as of **October 14, 2020**. This data is available and regularly updated on the PHSKC <u>COVID-19 data dashboard webpage</u>.

#### 2. Multilingual COVID-19 testing site flyers

Early testing remains one of our best tools for preventing COVID-19 from spreading in our communities. Public Health recommends that anyone who has a <u>sign/symptom of COVID-19</u> or close contact with someone who has COVID-19 be tested right away. They should home and away from others while waiting for test results.

Flyers about three new COVID-19 testing sites in South King County (Auburn, Renton, and Tukwila) are now available in twelve languages (see attached; flyers for the fourth new site in Federal Way are forthcoming). Please share with your networks.

### 3. OSPI dashboard on instruction modalities

The Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) has released a <u>statewide interactive</u> <u>dashboard</u> looking at the instruction modalities in the 2020-21 schoolyear. The dashboard breaks this information down by district, County, Educational Services District (ESD), COVID activity level, and student enrollment counts.

## 4. Governor's sporting activities FAQ

The Governor's Office released <u>Sporting Activities Frequently Asked Questions</u> (FAQ) this week. This responds to some questions that have been raised since the updates were released last week to the <u>Professional Sports & Other Sporting Activities COVID-19 Requirements</u>.

# 5. COVID-19 guidance for educators: Recognizing and reporting child abuse and neglect in online education settings

DOH released <u>COVID-19 guidance for educators: Recognizing and reporting child abuse and neglect</u> <u>in online education settings</u> which provides guidance for teachers, paraeducators, and other educational staff who interact with school-age children in online education settings. This guidance includes information on how to recognize signs of abuse and neglect, how to detect influential factors related to abuse or neglect, how to report concerns, and how educational staff can practice self-care.
