Equity and Social Justice (ESJ)

Fair and Just = overarching principle

- King County has adopted equity and social justice into all of our work.
- Economy and quality of life depends on everyone's ability to contribute.
- Health and wealth depend on race and place—where you live.
- We encourage proposals that include ESJ



Equity and Social Justice



Provides benefits to, and/or engages:

- people of color,
- limited English proficiency,
- Iow income communities
- Organization or partners have skills, relationships to engage community members

More Details

- 1. Min \$20,000, Max \$200,000
- 2. One **biennial grant cycle** for 2023/2024
- Yes, you can apply if your org already has an active grant
- 4. 1 step application process:
 - Full application; no Letter of Intent (LOI)
- 5. <u>Mapping tools</u> online
- 6. Grant Portal for online application & grant management
- 7. Overhead or billing rates

Matching Funds

Match can include

- 10%
- Cash match (other grants or interna funds dedicated to the project)
- In-kind donations (such as donated plants, materials)
- Volunteer hours



The Letter of Intent (LOI) is the first step in the process and is required to receive funding. To apply, go to Application process. **The deadline for Letters of Intent is February 17, 2021**.



TIPS for a Good Proposal

- 1. Start on your draft early
- 2. Submit early! We cannot accept late applications.
- 3. Review website guidelines
- **4. Clarity & logic** are important. Make sure your narrative, your scope of work, and your budget connect.
- 5. Double-check your math on budgets.

Tips from the Grant Ranking Committee

- 1. Get a reviewer!
- 2. Describe your prior experience and results
- Details are important; especially target outcomes
- 4. Remember the basics
- Water Quality = main criteria—make sure this is the focus!

What to Expect if Funded



Projects will begin in winter or spring 2024

Required:

- Quarterly reports--progress and expense, with metrics, backup documentation
- Final reports—narrative and financial, with actual match

Project completion 2 years after contracting; 3 years in some cases
