## Online Ballot Marking Program

- Voters with disabilities can mark their choices on the ballot online. The online ballot marking program has been designed specifically to enable voters who are blind or have low vision to cast a private ballot.
- If a voter's ballot is damaged or lost, the voter may mark their ballot on a computer and print it out. Return it at a ballot drop box or by mail before the 8 p.m. Election Day deadline.

This proposition authorizes the improvement and upgrade of District facilities; additions to five schools; district wide safety and security improvements; and authorizes the following excess levies for such purposes on all taxable property within the District:

The 2019 Levy maintains the current rate with no tax rate increase.

### Explanatory statement

Lake Washington School District requests voter approval of a Capital Projects levy to enable the district to pay for safety and security measures and critical classroom needs not funded by the state and needed to meet current and future educational programs for its students. The district has grown by over 6,000 students in the last 10 years and expects to enroll 2,000 more students by 2022.

These funds would be deposited in the Capital Projects Fund to pay for district-wide safety and security improvements; classroom additions at Lake Washington High School, including an auxiliary gym and commons; classroom additions at Carson, Franklin, Rose Hill and Twain Elementary Schools, including expansion of core facilities.

Passage of this proposition would allow the levy of \$20 million per year over the next six years. If authorized by the voters and based on current assessed valuation information, estimated levy rates would be an average of \$0.27 per thousand of assessed valuation beginning in 2020. This amount will be offset by a reduction in the debt service levy rate due to past bonds being paid off. The exact levy rate shall be adjusted based upon the actual assessed value of the property within the District at the time of the levy.

### Statement in opposition

The District has an overcrowding problem that it created. Voters approved bonds in 1998 and 2006 to update and enlarge schools, but instead the District initiated a program to replace all schools.

Twain, Mann, Thoreau, Juanita, Sandburg, Rose Hill, Lakeview, Franklin, Frost, Muir, Rush, Keller, Kirk, Bell, Redmond Middle, Rose Hill Middle, Finn Hill Middle, ICS, Kirkland Middle, Redmond High and Lake Washington High School - all were torn down and rebuilt. The beautiful new schools were 50% larger, but with the same number of classrooms and no increase in capacity. Most schools were overcrowded when they opened and needed portables. After 20 years of continuous school construction, we still don't have the adequate capacity that we should in the District.

The District's enrollment-forecasting model has consistently underestimated the 5-year student population growth rate by 40-70%. The Growth Management Act and city planning policies mandated higher density that generated increased enrollment, but the District never incorporated this into their planning.

For the money being spent, this levy builds very little classroom space, with almost all of it in Kirkland. Voting for this levy endorses the District's broken, irresponsible facilities planning practices that created the overcrowding crisis.

Over the last 20 years, Fall City Fire Department has made many proactive changes to meet the needs of the community. Now it is proposing to merge with another fire district to improve emergency services and save taxpayers money while maintaining local control.

Better service. We will have additional emergency personnel to respond to 911 calls. We also will have personnel trained to respond to water, hazardous materials, and technical rescue calls. There will be additional apparatus to respond and access to specialized equipment, such as a ladder truck.

Less cost. Taxpayers will save \$285,000 in annual operating costs. (You can look up your property tax savings on the web site below.) High cost items (such as stations, apparatus and equipment) will be shared by more people, which reduces the amount for taxpayers. This merger will provide long term stability and financial survivability as well.

Maintains local control. We will continue to have elected representation on the Board of Fire Commissioners. Our local firefighters can continue to serve Fall City, and have access to improved training programs to improve their skills to benefit our community. Please join us in voting "Yes" on Proposition 1.

This proposition will authorize the merger of King County Fire Protection District No.

27 into King County Fire Protection District No. 10. Both fire districts currently provide fire protection and emergency medical services within their boundaries and have a history of working cooperatively. The Commissioners of both fire districts have determined that a merger of the two organizations into a single fire department is in the best interest of the District's residents.

If a majority of the registered voters of District 27 vote for merger, then the merger will be effective on a date to be determined by concurrent resolutions of the Board(s) of Commissioners, but prior to August 1, 2019. If merger is approved, District No. 27 will be dissolved and the boundaries of King County Fire Protection District No. 10 will expand to include all areas currently in District 27. The merged district will be funded by a property tax and a fire benefit charge. The existing commissioners of both Districts will govern the merged district until the number of commissioners is reduced according to law.

We all love Fall City! We've consistently voted funding for firefighter salaries, operations, vehicles and remodeled station. In turn they provide services focused on the needs of our local community. Career and trained volunteer firefighters provide *3-person crews almost 100% of the time*, with 12 career firefighters budgeted in 2019 to further improve coverage. *Our district is financially strong* with a 2019 reserve of \$1.7M and will be debt-free in 2021.

*Merging with Fire District 10, we'd lose local control, accountability and assets we've paid for.* FD10 staffs Eastside Fire & Rescue, focused on regional service for 5 agencies. Projected savings for homeowners from their Fire Benefit Charge *can't be verified*; *State Auditor*, "Inaccurate financial reports limit access to financial information..." Their FBC disproportionately impacts businesses. *If we lose our businesses we lose the core of our community.* Lower value homes would pay more, *hurting those with less ability to pay and fixed incomes.* The FBC can be raised annually by FD10 commissioners *without voter approval.* Fall City would be small voting base in FD10 decisions and could end up paying for others' needs.

*We stand to lose more than can be gained. Merging with FD10 is irreversible. Vote No!*

Why did FD10 approach FD27 to merge? To get our money and station! Our firefighters want it for higher pay and benefits. They say merging will increase service. *Not True!* Other agencies automatically respond to major incidents now. They say our taxes will decrease. King County Fire Protection District 40 is responsible for providing fire protection and emergency medical services in your community. For over the last twenty years, the Fire District has funded these services primarily through a combination of property taxes and voter-approved benefit charges.

Benefit charges are based on risk factors and the cost of providing fire protection services, unlike property taxes that relate to the value of property. Under state law, voters must renew the use of benefit charges every six years and the Fire District's Elected Board of Commissioners is required to hold a public hearing each year to review and establish the amount of the benefit charge. Once established, the aggregate amount of the charge is pro-rated to individual properties based on risk factors and collected by the county assessor, together with property taxes. The amount of any benefit charge imposed on any given property cannot exceed the measurable benefits of the services afforded to the property by the Fire District and are subject to appeal.

Under state law, fire districts which collect benefit charges authorized under Chapter 52.18 RCW have reduced taxing authority. Benefit charges can constitute no more than 60 percent of a district's annual operating budget and the fire district's maximum property tax rate is reduced from \$1.50 to \$1.00 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

If approved, Proposition 1 would continue the current funding methods utilized by Fire District 40 to provide emergency medical and fire protection services for the next six years.

Voters of King County Fire District #40 first approved the Fire Benefit Charge (FBC) in 1990, reauthorizing it in 1995, 2001, 2007 and yet again in 2013. We are asking for your support to ensure fire and life safety protection for the citizens and businesses of Fairwood.

What is the advantage of the FBC? The FBC provides funding for appropriate staffing to operate a 24-hour aid car, a fire engine and modern apparatus to respond to emergencies. The fire district can keep its facilities safe, updated and maintained to provide essential services. The FBC allows the fire district to be less dependent on fluctuating property taxes while maintaining a stable service level for its citizens.

State law allows the FBC to be up to 60% of the fire district's operational budget. The district's Board of Fire Commissioners has stayed well below that amount, with an average since 2003 of around 42 percent.

We ask for your support in keeping our community safe.

## Explanatory statement

Woodinville Fire & Rescue is seeking reauthorization of the Benefit Charge. The Benefit Charge accounts for approximately 44 percent of Woodinville Fire & Rescue's budget. It was first approved by voters for six years in 1989, and subsequently has been renewed by voters at approximately six-year intervals, most recently in 2013. Voter approval is once again required in order to retain this revenue source. Renewal of the Benefit Charge for another six years (2020 through 2025) will allow Woodinville Fire & Rescue to maintain response times and service levels, train personnel and purchase equipment.

The Benefit Charge is based on the occupancy type and square footage of improvements to real property, and reflects the service level (i.e., fire flow of water) needed to control a fire in a particular building. Each year, the elected Board of Fire Commissioners holds a public meeting to review the Benefit Charge and ensure fiscal responsibility for the coming year. The law allows for partial exemptions from the charge for senior citizens, buildings with fire sprinkler systems and some agriculture-related improvements.

With the Benefit Charge in effect, state law prohibits the imposition of the \$.50 regular property tax for fire protection otherwise allowed by RCW 52.16.160.

Vashon Park District has worked hard over the years to get on solid financial footing. VES field is completed with new lights. We have a year round pool enjoyed by youth and seniors. The days of living on borrowed money are over.

Now is the time to move forward and complete the maintenance that has been deferred. This levy money will be approximately a 34% increase, about \$450,000 more collected. Over the next four years, this will allow us to tackle essential infrastructure projects and needed maintenance: to Agren and BARC fields, Lisabeula and Agren parking lots, major work on Belle Baldwin house, Inspiration Point wall, various projects at Point Robinson, install restrooms at all our parks, and work on invasive species remediation.

What is lacking are programs for our seniors. The Park District is hoping that this levy money will change that.

### Rebuttal of statement in opposition

Property taxes will not increase by 38%, only the park district portion of our property taxes is being increased. The 11 cents rate increase allows the District to complete its deferred maintenance projects over the next four years, while maintaining auditor-recommended adequate reserves. This is solid stewardship which will save us money. Updating and protecting our Park facilities while creating more programming is the responsible thing to do and will benefit islanders of all ages.

Passage of Proposition 1 would authorize the Vashon-Maury Island Park and Recreation District (Vashon Park District) to levy annually for four years excess property taxes to pay costs for operation and maintenance associated with the District's facilities. This levy will replace the District's expiring levy.

The proposed four-year Maintenance and Operations Levy would authorize the collection of levy amounts estimated to be \$0.52 per \$1,000 of assessed value in each of the years between 2020 and 2023. The tax rate of approximately \$0.52 per \$1,000 of assessed value projected for the first year of collection in 2020 would equate to \$52.00 per year (or \$4.33 per month) for a \$100,000 home.

The Park District is asking for too large a levy. By voting "No", you are advising the commissioners to return with a more reasonable request. Since the Board has determined no additional funds will needed to increase the current reserve, those funds now are available for other needs, including deferred maintenance. It should be noted, that in 2018 and 2019 levy receipts were at the highest level in Park District history. In fact, they are \$250,000/year higher than the average levy receipts collected during the four years when the District was spending \$1.5 million of levy receipts on VES.

While inflation has outpaced increased levy receipts by less than 3% during the past four years, the commissioners are requesting a 38% increase in property taxes. This demonstrates they have learned nothing from the fiscally irresponsible spending of the recent past. The Park District must learn to operate with a reasonable budget. There is no need to overtax the island so all the deferred maintenance and wish-list projects can happen immediately. Nobody on the island, especially those islanders on fixed incomes, will receive a 38% increase in income next year, and neither should the Park District. *Vote "No" on Proposition 1.*

### Rebuttal of statement in favor

The levy is not the *only* source of money. Grants and private funds provided the vast majority of the funds for the VES lights, BARC dish and pool dome. This funding model should continue.

The District already had the money for new recreational programs for seniors, but it chose to ignore the islanders' top priority from its 2016 survey and spent the money for lower priority items.
